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Introduction

In 1982 I thought it might be interesting to look into my family history. I started out knowing very little apart from the fact that my father, and his father, came from Southampton in Hampshire. I quickly found that there were far more references to the name Pitfield in the county of Dorset than anywhere else, and I established that my own Southampton Pitfields originated in Dorset.

Soon after starting on my genealogical quest I made contact with Michael Pitfield from Buckinghamshire who had already been doing some work on the Pitfield family. He had established that most of the Pitfield lines are descended from a Robert Pitfold of Allington in Dorset who had ten sons and who died in 1586. Michael and I worked together for some years on the Pitfield lines and found that we were both descendants of Sebastian Pitfold, the youngest of Robert's sons. Together we started to put more flesh on the bones of our pedigrees.

Michael Pitfield still does small pieces of Pitfield research and is heavily involved with the Dorset Online Parish Clerks (OPC) where he has published much material relating to the parish of Fordington (http://www.opcdorset.org/). I would like to acknowledge the help and support that I have received from Michael over many years.

I have continued to follow up Pitfold/Pitfield references wherever I can find them, with the aim of connecting them all together. These tables and notes show the results of my research. They are the sixth set of tables that I have produced on paper and incorporate revised interpretations of previous research, as well as new references uncovered in the last few years. I hope that by leaving copies with Record Offices and Genealogical Societies they will be available for many years to come for anybody who has an interest in the Pitfield family.

These tables do not show every Pitfields who has ever lived, as I have many references to individuals or small family groups found outside of Dorset and Devon, that I have been unable to connect with the main lines. I have shown the vast majority of those named Pitfield who appear in the 1911 census in England, Scotland and Wales, where I have been able to connect them to earlier generations. For those Pitfields who were married or born after 1911 I have relied on information passed onto to me by individual family members over the past few years. I have decided not to show any living Pitfield on these tables (including myself) for the sake of individual's privacy and possible exposure to identity fraud. If you had a grandparent whose name was Pitfield there is a very good chance that he/she will be shown on the tables that follow, allowing you to follow your line back through the generations.

The Dorset Family

The majority of the charts and notes in this volume relate to the Dorset family and show the known Pitfold/Pitfield descendants of Robert Pytfolde of Allington, Dorset (1516-1586). Details of the origins of this family are included in the Dorset Family Preface.

Petfield, Peatfield, Patefield, Pilfield, Pilfold etc

There are a number of family names, in various parts of Britain, that sound similar to Pitfield. Some of these names are well established and in some cases their use predates the name Pitfold, that later evolved into Pitfield. On occasion Pitfield might be written as Petfield or visa versa, which can cause problems when researching. In other instances these other family names have occasionally been written as Pitfield, with that spelling becoming the norm for a certain individual and for the generations that follow on. I have done very little research into the families of Petfield, Peatfield, Patefield etc but wherever the name changes into Pitfield I have researched the lines as much as possible, often working back to when the name change took place. Many of these family lines are connected to families that originated in Lancashire - see below and the Lancashire section of these tables. Other Pitfield families, whose names has evolved from other names, are shown elsewhere in these tables.

Unconnected Families

After the Dorset tables I have included a number of charts that show some family groups that I have been unable to connect with the main lines.

Lancashire Pitfields

The name Pitfield is also present in the county of Lancashire. These Pitfields are not connected with the Dorset family. Details of the origins of this family are included in the preface to this section.


How to navigate the tables

The numbering on the Dorset family tables follows the seniority of Robert's children – thus, for example, all tables that start with 8 show the descendants of Robert's eighth son (Henry). Robert Pitfold himself, as the "founding father" of the Dorset family is shown on Table Dorset 0.

If you find a person of interest and wish to trace their Pitfield ancestors then the tables can be followed back by dropping the last digit in the number that used in a table to navigate to its predecessor. Thus, the person who heads Table Dorset 10.1.1.4.1.3 will also be shown on Table Dorset 10.1.1.4.1 together with the generation or generations who precede him. The graphic below shows how the tables that show the descendants of

the 10th child of Robert Pitfold (1516-1586) - namely Sebastian Pitfold (1570-1613) - are interconnected.

There are a number of unconnected tables at the end of the Dorset section. These shown small family groups who I cannot link with the main lines.



Origins of the Pitfields

In Dorset and Devon the surname Pitfield evolved gradually from that of Pitfold/Pytfold/Pytefolde during the seventeenth century, with the Pitfold form staying in use until a later date in some parishes than in others, and with some individuals being referred to as Pitfield alias Pitfold. The earliest Pitfold traced in Dorset was John Pytfolde, who was taxed at Allington in 1525 and 1545. Despite lengthy research nothing else has been discovered regarding John and he appears to have no ancestors in Dorset, which seems to imply that he came from elsewhere in the country. After John Pytfolde of Allington there appears Robert Pitfolde (1516-1586), who was probably the son of John. A good deal is known about Robert and he is the "founding father" of a large group of Pitfield in Dorset and elsewhere and he is the ancestor of most of the individuals shown in this booklet.

An early family grouping has been found in the Berkshire parish of Brightwalton, who appeared to have used the surname PITFALL and PITFOLD. The Manor of Brightwalton was held by the Abbey of Battle in Sussex.

In the Manorial Court Rolls for Brightwalton, dated 1508, a William PITFALL is listed as a juror. The same document lists a Richard PYTVALE as a member of another jury and a Richard PYTFALL as a member of a third jury. Elsewhere in the same document it is noted that a Richard PYTFOLD was appointed to the office of deacon.

In a later Manorial Court Roll, that covers the years 1512-1529, a Richard Pitfall and a John Pitfall are listed in the same jury and a Richard Pitfall is listed in two further juries.

A document from 1522 (E 315/464 The National Archives) lists a John PITFOLD and a Richard PITFOLDE in the Manor of Brightwalton, as tenants of the Abbot of Battle and a John PITFOLD is listed as a servant.

To have three people with the same surname in the Manor of Brightwalton over the period of 1509-1529 implies that the family may have been present there for some time - to be members of a jury shows they must have been property owners and that Richard PYTFOLD must have been someone of some standing to be appointed to the position of deacon. We can only speculate how the three were related.

As can be seen in the chart opposite there are various other references to the names PITFALL and PITFOLD, in the county of Berkshire, some of which predate the earliest reference in Dorset and some that run concurrently. Of special interest is the fact a JOHN PYTFOLDE is listed at Brightwalton, Berkshire and a John PYTTEFFOLD is listed at Allington, Dorset - both in the year 1525.

I have been unable to prove any connection between the Berkshire family and the Dorset family but I think it is highly likely that John of Allington may have moved from Berkshire to Dorset. Robert Pitfold (1516-1586) of Allington named his eldest son Richard which could be significant as it was a popular name in the Berkshire family.

Still earlier references exist, in the records of Waverley Abbey, in the county of Surrey, which list a Phillip Pytfold who was ordained a subdeacon in 1459 and a priest in 1462. These references may be significant as there was a Pitfold Manor near Haslemere, Surrey, a few miles from Waverley Abbey, which was in existence as early as the tenth century. No connection between the manor of Pitfold and the emergence of Pitfold as a surname has been proved, but it is a possibility as many surnames came from place-names. A property called High Pitfold, near Haslemere, exists today.

Earlier still is William Pitfold of London, who was a member of the Guild of Merchant Taylors and a Freeman of the City of London. In 1398 he is listed in the Pardon Rolls as William Pitfold alias William Self. He died in 1422 and left a will that has not survived.

The earliest recorded instance of the name Pitfold that has been found is a John Pitfold, who was listed as a Man-at-Arms, under Captain Sir William de Windsor in the Standing Force in Ireland in 1374. Sir William was Viceroy of Ireland and the husband of Alice Perrers, mistress of Edward III.

A book on the origin of surnames, published during the 19th century, suggested that the Pitfield name came from one Ralph de Pettiville who came to England from the town of Pettiville, near Rouen in France, in 1198. However there seems to be no evidence to substantiate this.

It seems impossible to say with any certainty where the Pitfold name originated and how the family came to settle in Dorset and Devon, but I think it is likely that the ancestors of John Pytfolde of Allington came from central southern England where the earliest Pitfold references have been found.

Lancashire Pitfields

In the county of Lancashire the name Pitfield evolved from Paitfield and/or Patefield. These changes were generally quite modern, with the earliest instance of Pitfield appearing in the late 18th century. The original forms of Paitfield and Patefield, which have very early origins, have survived, alongside Pitfield, down to the present day. The Lancashire Pitfields have no connection to the Dorset family. I have shown the parts of the Lancashire families that "became" Pitfields in the Lancashire Pitfields section of this booklet.

By the 17th century the name PITFOLD had disappeared to be replaced by PITFALL. The family appear to move out from Brightwalton, with entries appearing in the records of nearby parishes. A number of wills are left by members of the PITFALL family in and around Brightwalton many of them being yeoman farmers. The name continues to appear in parish records and probate records until the early 18th century and then it seems to disappear. In the 1841 census, and in subsequent censuses, not a single PITFALL is listed.

At the beginning of the 17th century descendants of Robert PITFOLD of Allington (1516-1586) were established in south west Dorset and south east Devon. As the century progressed the name changed from PITFOLD to PITFIELD with some members of the family being referred to as PITFIELD alias PITFOLD in some documents. The name PITFOLD eventually disappeared and the name PITFIELD became established.

The Dorset Family - Preface

As outlined in the Introduction the majority of the charts and notes in this volume relate to the Dorset family. The charts show all of the known Pitfold/Pitfield descendants of Robert Pitfold (1516-1586) who lived in the parish of Allington, Dorset.

Robert Pitfold (1516-1586) of Allington, Dorset, had ten sons. Seven of these sons had children of their own. Most of the early family members remained in the south western corner of Dorset or in the south eastern corner of Devon. Later generations dispersed elsewhere in the country or settled in America, Canada, Australia and elsewhere. The tables follow a numbering system based on the ten children of Robert. Therefore, for example, any table that starts Dorset 8, shows part of the family descended from Robert's eighth son i.e. Henry Pitfold (-1637).

It is fortunate that parish records for Allington and surrounding parishes exist from the late 16th century and contain many Pitfold/Pitfield entries. However, some registers have gaps in them where records were not kept or pages have been destroyed by decay. Although the number of Pitfields were not numerous they tended to use a small number of christian names, so it was not uncommon for several cousins, bearing the same first name, to be living in the same or neighbouring parishes. It was also not unknown for two brothers to have the same Christian name. Records of marriages have been particularly difficult to find, meaning the first name of Pitfield wives are often known but their surname and date of marriage is unknown


There are a number of Pitfold/Pitfield wills that have survived - these, together with legal records, have helped me establish the relationships of various family groups. I have shown in the tables and notes where there is any uncertainty about the relationship of any one Pitfield to others, and in some places I have shown more that one possible parentage for an individual.


Unfortunately all wills, that were proved in various courts in the county of Devon, were destroyed by enemy action during World War II. A number of these were made by members of the Pitfold/Pitfield family.

- John Pytefolde is listed in the tax returns of the parish of Allington, Dorset for the years 1525 and 1545. He is shown in this pedigree as the father of Robert Pitfolde (c1516-1586) but there is no definite proof of this. It's possible that John died c1546. He appears in the tax records at Allington in 1545 but Robert Pitfold is listed in 1547.
- 2 In 1545 Robert Pitfold appears in the tax returns for the parish of Stoke Abbott. In 1552 he had a grant from the Borough of Bridport for a piece of land in Allington, whilst in the same year he is listed as one of the church wardens at Allington. He appears in a tax return at Allington in 1559.
- 3 In a deposition made in 1580 Robert Pitfold stated he was aged 64 years (C 24/144 National Archives)
- 4 Robert left a will dated 1583 and proved 1586
 - ...Richard eldest son... ...George second son... ...Robert third son... ...Andrew fourth son... ...Thomas fifth son... ...John the Elder sixth son... ...Henry eighth son... ...John the Younger ninth son... ...Bastian tenth son...
 - ...deed 28th November 20 Elizabeth (1578) which was granted to John Pitfold the Older my sixth son and to Alice Adeyne alias Barbette and to the heirs male of their two bodies...
 - ...Joane my wife... ...to grandchildren (no names given)... ...Joan Bilke my sister....

Robert was an extensive land owner and his will names land in the parishes of Allington, Whitchurch Canonicorum, Long Bredy, Marshwood, Symondsbury, Walditch, Shipton Gorge and Powerstock. He also gives details of those he bought the lands from, the names of tenants who occupied them, and how they were to be divided amongst his children. Robert died in 1586 and was buried at Whitchurch Canonicorum.

- In 1589 an Inquisition Post Mortem was held to enquire where Robert's lands were held. This gave similar information as was contained in Robert's will.
- 5 Case from Court of Requests 1595 states that Henry and Sebastian were executors of the will of Joan Pitfold their like deceased mother, wife and executrix of Robert Pitfold, their like deceased father (will of Joan has not survived).
- 6 In a case of 1616 it was stated that Joan Pitfold, mother of John Pitfold, Henry Pitfold and Sebastian Pitfold, deceased had been dead about 18 years.
- 7 Due to the references at 5 and 6 above I think it is likely that Joan was only the mother of Robert's youngest children and therefore Robert had been married previously.
- 8 John Bilke of Netherbury, Dorset left a will dated 1572 in which he named his wife Joan Bilke.





- 1 Richard Pitfold named as the eldest son of Robert Pitfold of Allington in Robert's will.
 - ...Item I give and bequeath unto Richard Pitfolde my best son all my lands tenements and hereditaments situate lying and being in Athlington aforesaid in the said county whiche I of late bought and purchased to me mine heirs and assignes of Elnor Lane widowe and Richard Lane her sonne to have and to hold the same Lands tenements and hereditaments unto the said Richard Pitfolde and to the heires male of his bodye lawfully begotten or to be begotten to hold of the theise confirmed(?)

- 2 In the Inquisition Post Mortem of Robert Pitfold (1516-1586), made in 1589, there is mentioned an indenture dated 1581 in which Robert gave lands to his son Richard and his wife Susan Clego.

Richard left twenty pounds and a number of specific household items to his daughter Ursula to have when she reached the age of seven

- 4 Joan re-married to William Sprake of Whitchurch Canonicourm in 1597.
- 5 William Sprake names Ursula Pitfold in his will made in 1602 this is the last reference to Ursula that has been found.
- 6 The wording of Richard's will seems to imply that Ursula was Richard's daughter but not Joane's, so she could have been the daughter of Richard and Susan.

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GOMELSHAY/GUMMERSHAY, WHITCHURCH CANONICORUM

Richard Pitfold (-1597), shown here, described himself as "of Gomelshay" when he made his will in 1597

His brother George Pitfold (-1618), Dorset 2 was described as "of Gomelshay" in a legal dispute circa 1599.

Another brother Henry Pitfold (-1637) Dorset 8 settled on the tenement and land called Gomelshay, where he remained until his death.

Gomelshay was part of the Manor of Wootton Abbas, within the parish of Whitchurch Canonicorum. Unfortunately records of the Manor have not survived.

During this period it was commonplace for leases to be issued for a number of "lives" often worded "for the term of their lives successfully". It seems likely that the three brothers purchased a lease on Gomelshay, from the Manor, on their three lives. A price would have been paid when the lease was taken out and the lessees would pay a yearly rent, until such time as the last of them died, when the premises would revert back to the Manor. This type of lease was known as copyhold tenure and took its name from the fact that the "title deed" received by the tenant was a copy of the relevant entry in the manorial court roll. A tenant — or mesne lord — who held land in this way was legally known as a copyholder.

For details of the continuing Pitfold/Pitfield connection with Gomelshay, following the death of the last lessee, Henry Pitfold (-1637) see Dorset 8.

There is still a GUMMERSHAY FARM in Whitchurch Canonicorum today.

George Pitfold (-1618) was the second son of Robert Pitfold of Allington (-1586) and was left land in the parishes of Whitchurch Canonicorum, Marshwood, Symondsbury and Powerstock in his father's will. He also came into possession of Gomelshay in Whitchurch Canonicorum, that had been the property of his elder brother Richard who died in 1597 (See table 2) - a document dated between 1596 and 1616 refers to "George Pytfolde of Gomelshays in the said county of Dorset, yeoman" (C3/270/1 - National Archives). Another document dated 1597 (C 2/Eliz/P11/28 - National Archives) refers to "George Pytfolde of Whitchurch, yeoman".

- 3 Andrew Pitfold (-1586) refers to his sister-in-law Alice Pitfold and to her daughter (unnamed) in the will he made in 1586. (See Dorset 4) He could have been referring to Alice, the wife of George and their daughter (possibly Edith). Alternatively he could have been referring to Alice, the wife of his brother John Pitfold the Elder (see Dorset 6).
- 4 John Pitfold of Burton Bradstock (1599-) died soon after 1626, as he had no further children baptised after this date, although no burial entry has been found for him. "Pentichost Pitfold widow" was listed at Burton Bradstock in a taxation record of 1628. Pentichost Pitfold, widow, married Thomas Gudge in 1631.
- 5 Penticost Gudge of Broadway left a will proved at Taunton in 1670 (this will has not survived).

- 6 There is a burial entry at Burton Brastock in 1625 for "John son of George Pitfold" This most likely refers to a George son of George and Alice, although no christening, marriage or burial for a George Pitfold has been found.
- 7 I have shown Henry Pitfold/Pitfield of Southampton as being the son of George and Alice. I have not been able to prove Henry's parentage, but from information about his life it would seem he was probably born c1600-1605. Assuming he is descended from one of the ten sons of Robert Pitfold (1516-1586) it would seem that George is the most likely candidate, through a process of eliminating the other nine sons as likely parents.

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

- 5 The 1672 burial entry at Broadwindsor reads "Joanne wife of Robert Pitfold of.....". It seems likely that this was the wife of Robert the Younger of Marshwood as Joan Ewen was from the parish of Broadwindsor. This seems to be bourne out by the fact that Robert did not name a wife in his will made 1673.
- John Turner of Whitchurch Canonicorum, made a will in 1673 in which he made "my trusty and well beloved friend Robert Pitfould Jn of Marshwood in the said county of Dorset, yeoman" one of the overseers of his will.
- The records show the christening in 1674 of "Elizabeth daughter of Robert and Joan Pitfold" and in 1675 of "Robert son of Robert Pitfold junior of Marshwood". Both these christenings come after Robert made his will in 1673 but before his death in 1675, so it would seem that Robert married for a third time, after making his will, to another Joan.
- In 1704 an indenture was drawn up "between Robert Pitfold alias Pitfeild late of Dungtree alias Dungston in the parish of Marshwood now of Allington alias Athlington in the county of Dorset and Thomas Burt of Bridport in the County of Dorset maltser on the one part and Daniel Taylor of Bridport...Maltster of the other part..." The indenture describes all of the lands that were conveyed to Robert Pitfold the younger in 1665. It would appear that the lands had passed to Robert Pitfold the Younger's son - Robert Pitfield - and that in 1704 Thomas Burt also had an interest in the lands. Robert Pitfield and Thomas Burt conveyed the lands to Daniel Taylor.
- The indenture of 1704 also shows that Robert Pitfield of Marshwood moved from the parish of Marshwood and settled in the parish of Allington. What became of him after this date is unknown.
- 10 The burial of a Joan Pitfield of Allington at Bridport in 1715 could have been the mother of Robert Pitfield (1675-
- 11 John Pitfield, the eldest son of Robert Pitfold the Younger of Marshwood, settled in the parish of Wootton Fitzpaine, where he was a miller.

John Pitfold/Pitfield was born in 1666 and christened at Broadwindsor. He married Mary and three children of the couple were christened at Burstock. The family then settled in the parish of Wootton Fitzpaine. In 1697 John purchased a 99 year lease, from Henry Henley, the owner of Champernhayes Manor which was within the parish of Wootton Fitzpaine, The lease was for two mills, a mill house plus various pieces of land totalling 14 acres. At the time of taking out the lease John's occupation was given as clothier. The lease was for three lives - namely John himself, his wife Mary and his son John. After settling at Wootton Fitzpaine the couple had a further three children christened in the parish.

Details of John Pitfield's lease appear at various times in the records of Champernhayes Manor and an entry in 1708 implies that John intends that his son Roger (1702-1775) will take over the lease, rather than his son John.

There are no records of Champernhaves Manor between 1709 and 1719, but in 1719 the lease was held by John Bampfield, implying that John was deceased by then and his widow had sold the remainder of the lease to Bampfield. No burial entry has been found for John Pitfold.

2 Mary Pitfield was christened at Wootton Fitzpaine in 1708 "ve daughter of John and Joan Pitfield". I think it is likely that this is an incorrect entry as I have no evidence that John married twice.







- Grace Eyres had been born Grace Bird and was christened at Sturminster Newton in 1708. She was part of a long established family within the parish. She married John Eyres in 1736 at Blandford St. Mary. John Eyres died in 1743 and Grace remarried to Robert Pitfield in the following year.
- No christenings of any children of Robert and Grace Pitfield have been traced.
- Robert Pitfield left a will made 1756 and proved 1763
 - ...I Robert Pitfield of Sturminster Newton...(no occupation given)
 - ...my brother Roger Pitfield...
 - ...my brother Henry...
 - ...my wife Grace...
 - ...mv godson Robert Pitfield, son of John Pitfield, deceased...
 - ...mv godson John Bird...

No children of his own are mentioned

- 8 Grace Pitfield left a will, made in 1785 and proved in 1788. She did not name any children Amongst those named was Martha Pitfield - no relationship was given but it seems likely the Martha named was the one born 1776, daughter of Robert Pitfield (c1743-1820) of Wooton Fitzpaine - see Table Dorset 2.1.1.3
- The land tax records for Sturminster Newton lists from 1780 (earliest record that survives) until 1786 Grace Pitfield as a tenant of "The Malt House", owned by Thomas Bird Junior.

FLIZABETH PITFIFLD

An Elizabeth Pitfield is listed in the Land Tax Records of Sturminster Newton in 1793 as being the occupier, along with a John Sweet, of the Mill at Sturminster Newton. The owner of the mill is given as Mrs Hannah Bird. Hannah Bird would have been the widow of the Rev. John Bird, a nephew of Grace Bird/Eyers/Pitfield

A Mrs Elizabeth Pitfield is also listed as the proprietor of some land in Child Okeford in 1780 - see Table 2.1.1.1 for details of John Pitfield of Child Okeford

I do not know who this Elizabeth Pitfield is and I have not found a burial record for her at Sturminster. Newton or elsewhere. It is possible she was the daughter or daughter-in-law of John Pitfield of Child Okeford (see Table 2.1.1.1).

10 A Daniel Pitfield was buried in the Somerset parish of Hardington Mandeville in 1786. Nothing further is known concerning Daniel despite extensive research in records of parishes close to Hardington Mandeville. I think it is likely that he is another child of John and Mary of Wootton Fitzpaine, as Henry of Whitchurch Canonicorum (1697-1779) named a son Daniel and John of Wootton Fitzpaine and Colyton (1695-1746) had a grandson christened Daniel.

it is possible that the George Pitfield who was at Fulham in 1770 could be the same one who appears in New York in 1780. Being a parent in 1770 is consistent with a birth date of circa 1749 - the likely year of birth of George Pitfield of New Brunswick.

Notes for Table 2.1.1.1

- John Pitfield (1695-1746) was the eldest son of John Pitfield (1666-) and Mary (c1673-1739) of Wootton Fitzpaine. In 1720 he married at Charmouth, Dorset. The marriage entry describes him as "of Wootton Fitzpaine" and his bride as "Elizabeth Seaward of Axmouth" Axmouth is in the county of Devon. The couple settled in the Devon parish of Colyton, where the Seward family were established several wills were made in the mid 18th century by members of the Seaward family "of Colyton" unfortunately none have survived. It seems likely that John gained some property and land as a result of the marriage.
- 2 Elizabeth Pitfield died a year after the marriage and was buried at Colyton.
- 3 John remarried in 1724 at Honiton to Hannah Hallett and the couple had nine children christened.
- 4 References to John Pitfield at Colyton, apart from the parish record entries, are scarce. Some parish record entries refer to him as "Mr" indicating he was a property owner and of some standing in the parish.
- 5 The family had fallen on hard times by 1746 when the Pitfield household failed to pay the church rates. In 1747 "Mrs Hannah Pitfield" received several payments from the parish's overseers of the poor. The use of the title "Mrs" indicates she was a person of some standing, despite receiving poor relief.
- 6 Hannah was a widow by 1746, but no burial of John Pitfield is recorded at Colyton. However a John Pitfield was buried in the Dorset parish of Sturminster Newton in 1746 presumably he had died whilst visiting his brother Robert Pitfield of Sturminster Newton (1696-1763) see Table 2.1.1.
- 7 In November 1747 Hannah had her payments drastically cut when she refused to have her children bound out as apprentices (It was common for poor children to be apprenticed to reduce the financial burden on the parish).
- 8 In 1747 John and Hannah's eldest son John had settled in Dorset and married Mrs Mary Crago at Shillingstone, Dorset. The marriage entry refers to him as "Mr". This, together the use of "Mrs" for his bride indicate he was well off, which seems be in contrast to his mother accepting parish relief. The name Crago was rare in Dorset, although the marriage entry states Mrs Mary Crago was "of Sturminster Newton". The name was more common in Devon (including Colyton) and Cornwall. I have been unable to trace the origins of Mrs Mary Crago.
- 9 In 1748 payments were made for the illegitimate child of Elizabeth Pitfield and for the child's funeral no christening or burial for the child is recorded in the parish records.
- 10 In March 1750 Hannah Pitfield was paid poor relief for 3 months in arrears "being gone to Bristol with part of her family". It could be that Hannah was visiting Bristol to arrange a marriage for her daughter Elizabeth.
- 11 In September 1750 Elizabeth Pitfield married George Richardson. Although the marriage took place at Colyton it seems likely that George Richardson was from Bristol, where there were several established families of the name. Richardson as a surname was not prevalent in east Devon at this time. No trace of Elizabeth and George Richardson have been found in the records of Devon. Several references appear in the Bristol records that could possibly refer to George and Elizabeth Richardson.
- 13 In January 1753 a newspaper report refers to "Mrs Hannah Pitfield, who travels with lace" being attacked between Wells and Bath and having her lace and money stolen. She is described as a "Widow with nine Children". Hannah did have nine children christened but by 1753 one was married, another deceased and several were young adults.
- 14 It would seem that Hannah Pitfield was something of a problem to the parish because in April 1753 a payment was made to the Overseer's of the Poor for expenses to travel to the home of Sir John Prideaux for a meeting "abt ye widow Pitfield". Sir John Prideaux was the sixth Baronet of Netherton, Devon. (1695-1766)
- 15 Also in April 1753 Hannah was made a payment "in extremity" to buy a pair of shoes to travel to Bristol. It could be that she travelled with some of her children her son Robert married at Bedminster, Bristol in 1755 and Hannah's daughter Susanna was buried at Bedminster in 1759.
- 16 Hannah continued to receive payments from the parish up until at least 1769. Poor relief records for Colyton do not survive after 1769.
- 17 Despite Hannah relying on parish relief it is known that her sons were literate and well educated. It is likely that they received financial support from other members of the Pitfield family. It seems that Hannah Pitfield could have been an 18th century "benefit fraudster".
- Little is known about John Pitfield (1727-1771) of Child Okeford except for the entries in the parish records. As seen in note 8 he appears to have been a "Gentleman" at the time of his first marriage. No children from this marriage have been traced, although it is possible the Mrs Elizabeth Pitfield at Note 19 could have been a daughter or daughter-in-law of the couple. I also believe that George Pitfield (1749-1827) was the son of John Pitfield of Child Okeford. See Notes 21-23 below.

An Elizabeth Pitfield is listed in the Land Tax Records of Sturminster Newton in 1793 as being the occupier, along with a John Sweet, of the Mill at Sturminster Newton. The owner of the mill is given as Mrs Hannah Bird. Hannah Bird would have been the widow of the Rev. John Bird, a nephew of Grace Bird/Eyers/Pitfield - see Table 2.1.1. A Mrs Elizabeth Pitfield is also listed as the proprietor of some land in Child Okeford in 1780. I do not know who this Elizabeth Pitfield is and have not found a burial record for her at Sturminster Newton or elsewhere. It is possible she was a daughter or daughter-in-law of John of Child Okeford (1727-1771)

George Pitfield of New York, America and New Brunswick (c1749-1827)

- 20 Family tradition in North America has it that George Pitfield (c1749-1827) was the brother of Benjamin Pitfield (1741-1793) of New Jersey.
- 21 George Pitfield's age at the time of his death in 1827 was given as 78, giving a date of birth of circa 1749. Hannah Pitfield had been a widow since 1746 so it seems unlikely that she was the mother of George, although she could have been if George's date at death was incorrect and he was born a few years earlier.
- 22 In 1885 George William Brown, of Philadelphia, America, wrote a book entitled "Historical Genealogy relating to a Branch of the Brown Family". In the volume Brown states that his wife's grandfather, Benjamin Pitfield (1741-1793) came to America from England but nothing was known of Benjamin's origins in England. My research has now established Benjamin's origins. Brown says in his book that Benjamin came to America at the invitation of an uncle who was in possession of a tract of land lying upon Timber Creek, in the state of New Jersey. I think this part of Brown's narrative has been distorted and that in fact it was George Pitfield who was invited to America by his uncle Benjamin Pitfield who was indeed settled at Timber Creek, New Jersey. If George Pitfield (c1749-1827) was the nephew of Benjamin then he must have been the son of John Pitfield of Child Okeford (1727-1771). A birth of George Pitfield around 1749 would fit with the marriage of John Pitfield to Mary Crago in 1747. There would have been only eight years difference in the ages of the uncle and nephew.
- 23 Unfortunately, as stated in Note 18 above, very few references to John Pitfield (1727-1771) and Mary Crago exist and no christening of any children have been found. But note 19 above points to an Elizabeth Pitfield possibly being a daughter or daughter-in-law to the couple. It is possible that the couple had their children christened in a nonconformist church or chapel and that the records have not survived.

Other researchers have put forward another theory concerning George Pitfield of New York and New Brunswick. They think that he was originally name Pettfield and was the son of George Pettfield and Isabel Jefferson of Hessle in Yorkshire.

Because this theory has some merits and casts doubt on George Pitfield's connection to the Dorset Pitfield family I have chosen to show George Pitfield (c1749-1827), and his descendants, on a sperate set of tables, later in this yolume - starting with George 1.

The two theories concerning the origins of George are discussed in more detail on table George 1.

- Following the death of his first wife in 1763 John Pitfield (1727-1771) remarried in 1764 to Susannah Kaines.
- 25 Susannah Kaines was the daughter of William Kaines of Child Okeford, who left a will in 1764. William left large sums of money to his three daughters Elizabeth, Susannah and Jane with the remainder of his estate going to his son Henry Kaines.
- 26 John Pitfield (1727-1771) and Susannah Kaines had two children, before John died and was buried at Child Okeford.
- 27 The tax returns list Mrs Pitfield or Susannah Pitfield as the proprietor of property in Child Okeford from 1780. From 1813 until 1831 the proprietor is names as "Late Susannah Pitfield". Also in the parish is property owned by a Mr Kaines.
- 28 Elizabeth Kaines left a will made in 1776
 - ...Elizabeth otherwisw Betty Kaines of Child Okeford, Dorset, spinster....
 - ...two niecrs Elizabeth and Lucy Kaines and to my nephew William Yeatman...
 - ...to mv sister Susannah Pitfield...
 - Elizabeth left the bulk of her estate to Susannah Pitfield and made her executor.
- 29 John Pitfield (1768-1821) was the only surviving son of John Pitfield (1727-1771) and Susannah Kaines and settled in London where he was a warehouseman. He had a short lived marriage his wife and daughter dying at the time of the daughter's birth.
- 30 Henry Kaines, farmer of Child Okeford, and brother of Susannah Kaines/Pitfield, kept a journal throughout his life. In the journal he describes travelling to London on business and staying with his "cousin" John Pitfield at Watling Street. He also says John Pitfield and his wife Mary visited him in Dorset in 1814 and notes the death of Mary Pitfield in 1815.
- 31 John Pitfield (1768-1821) wrote a letter from Bridport in 1789 and another from London in 1790 to his "Uncle Benjamin Pitfield" in New Jersey. These letters are thought to still be in the possession of the Pitfield family in North America. They constitute the best evidence we have that the Benjamin Pitfield who appeared in America was the same Benjamin Pitfield, christened at Colyton in 1741. As well as being the nephew of Benjamin Pitfield of America, John would have been the half-brother of George Pifield of Canada.

Notes for Dorset 2.1.1.1.1 - the family of Benjamin Pitfield of America (1741-1793)

The earliest reference I have to Benjamin Pitfield, in North America, is his marriage in 1770 to Grace Lucas in Burlington, New Jersey. The Lucas family were Quakers and the marriage took place in the Quaker Meeting House. Benjamin Pitfield was described as "not of the faith" showing that he was not a Quaker.

'A pretty story is told of Benjamin Pitfield and Grace Lucas. Benjamin was an officer in His Majesty George the Third's army during the Revolutionary War, and while stationed in the suburbs of Philadelphia, he used to see Grace ride in from the country on a pillion behind her father. The gay young officer lost his heart to the demure little Quaker maiden, but his suit was frowned upon by the stern old father, who did not wish so worldly a son-in-law. Whereupon an elopement was planned and carried out, with the aid of a rope ladder from Grace's window and a fleet steed, the runaway couple securing the aid of a dominie before they were caught by father Lucas, who then had nothing to do but to give them his blessing, which he did, adding the household silver, which is still in the family. It is said that, of the sons, all followed in their mother's footsteps, and became strict Friends, while the daudhters preferred the Church of Enaland, to which their father belonged."

In "Historical Genealogy Relating to a branch of the Brown family" by George Williams Brown (1885) Brown says "[Benjamin] married Grace Lucas after an opposed and somewhat romantic courtship", but gives no further details.

I have been unable to find any information to prove or disprove the elopement story, although it is certainly true that Benjamin Pitfield was not of the Quaker faith and according to Brown "never became a member of the Society of Friends". The assertion that their sons followed the Quaker faith and the daughters didn't is not true - the couple only had one son and one daughter, who both followed the Quaker faith. It is possible that Benjamin was a British soldier, although I have not found any evidence to support this. If he was a soldier it would not have been at the time of the Revolutionary War, as this did not begin until 1776.

George William Brown was married to Ann Eliza Pitfield, grand-daughter of Benjamin Pitfield. In his book Brown says that Benjamin Pitfield emigrated from England after being invited by an uncle who was living at Timber Creek, in the state of New Jersey (this reference is discussed further in the notes relating to George Pitfield 1749-1827 on table Dorset 2.1.1.1.2). Brown says that the present family (at time of writing in 1885) have no knowledge of Benjamin's origins before arriving in America. However Brown refers to two letters, then in the possession of the family, written by a John Pitfield to his "Uncle Benjamin". The first letter was written in 1789 from Bridport and the second letter was written in 1790 from London. These letters were in the possession of Dr Robert Pitfield of Germanstown, Pennsylvania in 1935. It is thought they are still with a descendant of Dr Robert Pitfield, although I have been unable to trace them.


These letters provide us with the link back to the Pitfield family in England as they were almost certainly written by John Pitfield of London (1768-1821) shown on Dorset 2.1.1.1, who was the nephew of the Benjamin Pitfield, christened at Colyton, Devon in 1741.

Benjamin Pitfield was a store-keeper and grocer and moved between Gloucester County and Trenton, both in New Jersey and Philadelphia City in Pennsylvania. The town of Trenton is on the opposite bank of the Delaware river from Philadelphia. Benjamin was living and working in an area that saw a lot of military action during the War of Independence, although I have not been able to find out how it affected Benjamin.

- 1770 Marriage to Grace Lucas
- 1771 Said to inhabit the Gabriel Davies Tavern on the road leading from Gloucester Township to Great Egg Harbor.
- 1772 Subscriber to a volume of poems by Nathaniel Evans
- 1773 &
- 1774 Paid tax in Gloucester County, NJ
- 1774 A Committee of Observation, consisting of 77 members, was appointed for Gloucester County members chosen by those qualified to vote for the legislature. Amongst the 77 was Benjamin Pitfield, who represented Gloucester Township

In the American Revolution, Committees of Safety, also called Committees of Observation and Committees of Inspection, were local committees of Patriots that became a shadow government; they took control of the Thirteen Colonies away from royal officials, who became increasingly helpless. (Wikipedia)

- 1776 Beniamin's son Robert Lucas Pitfield is born
- 776 July Patriots rebel against British control and declare the United States of America an independent nation.
- 1777 Philadelphia occupied by British forces.
- 1778 British forces evacuate Philadelphia and withdraw to New York City.
- 1779 Benjamin bought property from John Clement of Haddonfield for 420 pounds.
- 1779 Benjamin Pitfield paid State or Five Shilling Tax in the City of Philadelphia.
- 1780 Deed for Benjamin Pitfield, shopkeeper & Grace his wife on a sale of property (same as bought from John Clement) to Matthias Gilbert.
- 1780/81 Benjamin Pitfield listed as a Private in the Philadelphia Militia.
- 1780 Benjamin Pittfield, grocer, paid the Effective Supply Tax in the City of Philadelphia.
- 1781 Will of Christopher Sickler of Gloucester Township mentions land he bought from Benjamin Pitfield.
- 1781 Benjamin Pitfield paid Effective Supply Tax in the City of Philadelphia.
- 1783 End of American War of Independence
- 1784 Moved from Philadelphia to Trenton (see Petition to Benjamin Franklin 1787, below).
- 1784 31st May Benjamin Pitfield advertised the opening of his new store in Trenton opposite the Blazing Star, with housewares, hardware, etc for sale.
- 784 Benjamin Pitfield elected as a trustee of the Trenton Academy.
- 84 Named as executor of the will of Robert Lucas, his father-in-law.
- 1785 14th March Benjamin Pittfield of Trenton, acting as executor, advertises for sale the plantation of Robert Lucas, deceased.
- 1785 20th June Beniamin Pitfield advertises various items for sale at his store in Trenton, formerly owned by Mr Pinkerton.
- 1785 Philadelphia muster roll of 4 company, 2nd Battalion Philadelphia Militia COMMANDED BY LIEUT. COLO. JAMES READ, ESQ'R. Lists Benjamin Pittfield
- 1787 April moved from Trenton back to Philadelphia (see Petition to Benjamin Franklin, below).
- 1787 3rd December Benjamin Pitfield wrote from Philadelphia to Benjamin Franklin, Governor of Pennsylvania, stating that he had moved from Philadelphia to Trenton in 1784, and moved back to Philadelphia in April 1787. He is petitioning against having had to pay duty on goods that had been sent from Trenton to Philadelphia, having already paid duty on them when they arrived in Trenton.
- 1788 Benjamin Pitfield listed in the 6th Company of the 2nd Battalion of the Philadelphia Militia.
- 1789 Petition of Benjamin Pitfield, of the City of Philadelphia, to George Washington, President of the United States, saying he has been in trade for many years but has fallen on hard times. He asks to be appointed to some government office that will allow him to support his family.
- 1790 Census Benjamin is listed twice in Philadelphia City.
 - 1 Shopkeeper in North Front Street the household consisted of 4 free white males over 16 (including Head of household), 1 free white male under 16, 4 free white females and no slaves.
 - 2 Grocer in Market Street
- 1793 September 13th Benjamin died from Yellow Fever one of several epidemics that hit Philadelphia City.
- 1793 September 13th buried in St. Paul's Old Episcopal Church, Philadelphia



- Henry Pitfield, who was christened at Wootton Fitzpaine, settled in Whitchurch Canonicoum around 1730 and was the founding father of a second group of Pitfields in the parish, soon after the first group died out naturally with the death of another Henry Pitfield in 1716 (see Table 8.1)
- 2 A stone set into the wall of the church at Whitchurch Canonicorum reads "these arches were rebuilt by Henry Pitfield, mason, 1738."
- 3 No marriage of Henry to Susannah has been found and the christening of only three children has been traced -Henry's will gives fuller details of his family.
- 4 Henry Pitfield left a will made 1774 proved 1782



There was something peculiarly hard in the case of *Pitfield*, who was released from Dorchester goal by his Majesty's bounty, in paying a debt of 220l. for law charges. It is thus related in the *Oracle:*-

Several years ago, Lord Milton, as Lord of the manor of Whitchurch Canonicorum in Dorsetshire, laid claim to part of a hill not far from Axminster, called Haddon Hill, of which Lord Arundell, of Wardour, was then in possession, as Lord of the manor of Chideock. And, in order to try the question of right, Lord Milton erected a cottage on the Chideock side of the hill, and placed Pitfield and his family in it. This cottage was immediately afterwards pulled down by order of Lord Arundell; and Pitfield, therefore, at the instance of Lord Milton, and solely on his Lordship's account, commenced an action against the aggressors, who justified as the agents of Lord Arundell.

In his action, Mr. Lambert of Dorchester, Lord Milton's solicitor was employed; and the cause was tried at Dorchester assizes before the late Mr. Justice Nares, and a special jury, in 1780, and a verdict given in favour of the defendants. The defendants' taxed costs amounted to 220l. and on application to Lord Milton for payment, he absolutely refuted it; but the defendants' thinking his Lordship would not suffer the poor man to lay in goal for the costs, and arrested him for the amount; and, to the surprise of every one, he was allowed to languish in prison from that time, (upwards of ten years) till he was lately discharged!!

Pitfield, the object of our amiable Monarch's benevolence, (though almost overcome with joy at so unexpected a deliverance) is actually voluntarily returned to the place of his confinement, (Dorchester Goal) declaring, he was so habituated to captivity, that he should be unhappy in any other situation; and Mr. Andrews, the keeper, has appointed him to some little office in the prison.







To U.S. on wedding day 50 years ago

BUT THEY JUST HAD TO RETURN TO DORSET

On Tuesday Mr. And Mrs. Bob Pitfield of Osselhay Farm, Whitchurch Canonicorum, remembered a momentous Spring day in 1910 for it was on March 29 of that year they became man and wife in the parish church at Whitchurch. And it was on that same day that they set out for a new life together in Canada.

Bob Pitfield, then 25, of Hinkhams Farm, and his 21-year old finance, Rose Knight, drove in a trap into the village from the Knight's family home at Crabbs, Bluntsea, at eight o'clock in the morning. Back home again from the wedding breakfast and then off again in Mr. Arthur Pitman's trap to Bridport station to set out on the journey to Canada.

As the "Bridport News" of the day said in its report of the wedding, "About two hours afterwards the happy couple left by train at Bridport for America, via Liverpool, with the very best wishes of numerous friends."

That day marked the beginning of 11 years spent in Canada but perhaps even more important the beginning of 50 years of happy marriage.

BUILT HOUSE, DUG WELL

Mr. and Mrs. Pitfield spent much of their 11 years in Canada in a lonely farm in Saskatchewan. Like the other "homesteaders" around them their land cost them 10 dollars from the Canadian government. But they built their own house and dug their own well.

Living on a 160 acre farm with only six cows provides frugal income so for part of the year Mr. Pitfield left his wife and family to travel the 200 miles into the town of Indian Head to look for work as a mason.

While he was away Mrs. Pitfield looked after the farm and drove the horses the 12 miles into the nearest town once a month to pick up the mail and the newspapers.

In spite of the hardships Mr. and Mrs. Pitfield won their "10 dollar bet with the Canadian government" and legally took over their farm after five years. But in 1922 they felt the call of the homeland, sold their farm, returned with their five children to England and settled down in Dorset.

Mr. Pitfield worked as a mason but 30 years ago they had the chance to buy Osselhay Farm and they took it. Mr Pitfield carried on his work as a mason until he was 60. Since then he has devoted all his time to his 28 acres.

LONE FARMER

Today at 75 Mr. Pitfield is still running his farm largely on his own. He milks seven cows, tends a large garden and has his chickens and his orchards.


Osselhay is tucked away in a slumbering corner of the Marshwood Vale. It is approached by a long track across the field from the lane. The television aerial, and the tractor in the shed offer the only hints that the life of the 20th century has dared to introde

The farm is straight from the glossy calendars with its low oak beams, open hearths and honeysuckle around the door.

And Mr. and Mrs. Pitfield still welcome their visitors with a pot of cool, home-made cider drawn straight from the barrel in the cellar. It was not so long ago that Mrs. Pitfield was making her own butter and cheese.

And how did Mr. and Mrs. Pitfield celebrate their anniversary? "No celebrations at all," said Mr. Pitfield. "It was just a normal day."

But there were more visitors than usual driving up the lane to Oselhay on Tuesday. Most of Mr. and Mrs. Pitfield's nine children and ten grandchildren looked in to bring their presents and offer their congratulations.

Roger Pitfield (1702-1775) was the voungest son of John Pitfield and like his father he was a miller. As seen on Dorset 2.1 his father held a 99 lease on some mills and land in the parish of Wootton Fitzpaine, but the remains of the lease appear to have been sold following the death of John (between 1709 & 1719). There is evidence in the records of the manor of Champernhayes, in the parish of Wootton Fitzpaine, that Roger paid rent for these mills direct to the freeholder (Lord of the Manor) over a number of years. At other times, during Roger's lifetime, the mills were held by leaseholders and it seems likely that Roger continued to occupy them and paid rent to the holders of the lease.

In 1743 "Roger Pitfield, a miller" took a 99 year lease on a cottage and three acres of land - part of the Manor of Champernhayes. The lease was on his life and on the lives of his son John and daughter Martha.


No christening of any children of Roger Pitfield and Joan Clutworthy have been traced - it is possible that Roger and Joan were nonconformists - but the dates of birth of Martha and John can be estimated from details in the lease of 1743 (although it is possible that they were born a few years earlier than shown here). They also had another son Robert - born after the lease was taken out - circa 1743 (estimated from his age at the time of his burial)

The rent on the lease of the cottage and land continued to be paid after the death of Roger in 1775 but "fell into hand" in the late 1790's. It would seem that the rent

was paid by John Pitfield (1742-1798) as the third "life" on the lease until a few years before his death in 1798. Although this family group is not within the county of Dorset, the Christian names used are familiar from the Dorset family and the surname used varies from Pitfold to Pitfield in a similar manner to the Dorset family. The date of Henry being granted his freedom at the end of his apprenticeship implies a date of birth of c1600-1605. Assuming he is descended from one of the ten sons of Robert Pitfold (1516-1586) the most likely candidate for his father would be George Pitfold (-1618) shown on table Dorset 2.







- 2 The christening of only one child of Robert's has been found Tobias in 1597 but a great deal of genealogical information concerning the children of Robert and Anne can be gleamed from a number of legal disputes, that took place after Robert's death.
- 3 A court case of 1620 C3/321/41 National Archives, plaintiffs Anne Pitfold, widow of Allington and her son Henry Pitfold on behalf Nicholas Pitfold, another son of Anne against (amongst others) "Henry Pitfold a kinsman." The reply by Henry Pitfold, the kinsman, shows him to be Henry Pitfold the Elder of Whitchurch Canonicorum (uncle to Henry and Nicholas) see Table Dorset 0 and Table Dorset 8.
- A court case in 1622 C2/Jasl/P2/37 National Archives states that Robert Pitfold made a will in 1605 (this will has not survived). The deposition in the case states that Robert Pitfold left some land in the will, called Crocker's Tenemnt in Allington, to Henry Pitfold referred to "as his second son". It further states that Henry the son transferred the land to his Uncle Henry Pitfold in 1618 see Table Dorset 0 and Table Dorset 8.
- There are several other court cases in the years that follow concerning Crocker's Tenement. These cases show that Henry Pitfold was aged only 7 years at the time of the death of his father Robert Pitfold in 1605 and that his uncle, Henry Pitfold of Whitchurch Canonicorum, was his godfather and became his guardian. In 1622 Henry Pitfold the nephew took action against his uncle, Henry Pitfold of Whitchurch Canonicorum, accusing him of persuading him (Henry the nephew) to sell Crocker's Tenement to him (Henry the uncle), in 1618, when Henry reached the age of 21, and not paying him a fair price. In one of the answers to the complaint, given by Henry Pitfold the uncle he states that at one point Henry Pitfold the nephew had been imprisoned, at Dorchester goal, as the alleged father of an illegitimate child by a Grace Webber.
 - The legal disputes also show that Henry Pitfold the nephew had an elder brother named Nicholas Pitfold, a tanner, born c1589 and an other brother Maximillian Pitfold, a tanner. They also refer to a meeting held at the house of Sir Robert Mellor of Up Cerne in 1619. Sir Robert Mellor was the lord of the manor of Up Cerne. The meeting was to discuss the forthcoming marriage of Henry Pitfold to the daughter of William Polden a dispute over the marriage had become part of the original dispute concerning Crocker's Tenement. The name of William Polden's daughter is not given but the marriage appears to have gone ahead, circa 1619, probably at Up Cerne (parish records don't start until 1650). It would seem Polden's daughter was called Judith.

- 1 I have been unable to establish the parentage of Nicholas Pitfield of Loders and Shipton Gorge with any certainty. He is listed in the Protestation Oath records of 1641/42 at Loders. The Protestation Oath was taken by all males over the age of 18. This would mean that he would have been born before 1623. I think the most likely candidate to be the father of Nicholas Pitfold is Henry Pitfold of Allington and it is possible Nicholas was born at Up Cerne see Note 5 above.
- 8 In 1672 Nicholas Pitfould of Loders is listed as one of those pensioned at the Restoration and still surviving in 1672 and receives a pension of £2 per annum. A birth circa 1620-1623 would fit well with him being a soldier in his twenties during the English Civil War. A cousin Edward Pitfold, Dorset 6 fought on the Parliamentary side.
- 9 Administration, dated 1681, of the goods of Nicholas Pitfield of Shipton, was granted to Anne Pitfield, widow, relict.

Various Robert Pitfold/Pitfield families in the parish of Allington.

The name Robert was very popular with the Pitfold/Pitfield family - especially in the parish of Allington. At the time of the Hearth Tax of 1662/64 there were four Robert Pitfields who were assessed to pay tax - one of these was noted as deceased. In the parish records of Allington there are a number of children christened between 1641 and 1720, all sons and daughters of a Robert Pitfold/Pitfield. In the majority of cases the mother's name is not given in the record so it is very difficult to see which family each child belongs to. In addition there is a gap in the Allington register from 1704 until 1716 where I would expect to see further Pitfold/Pitfield christenings.

I have identified three Robert Pitfold/Pitfield, who were contemporaries and were connected with Allington.

Robert Pitfield, died in 1686, who married Hannah Osborne in 1639 - shown on **Table 8.1** - this couple settled in Shipton Gorge but they lived their first years of married life in Allington. Because this Robert left a will and there are other sources of information concerning him I am sure of his ancestry and descendants.

Robert Pitfield, died in 1682, who married Mary Pomory - shown below. The notes attached show why I have attributed him with the children shown, although there is some doubt about some of them.

Robert Pitfield, died in 1694, who married Bridget White in 1667 - shown below. I have virtually no information about his couple. I have given them the children shown but there is some doubt about them because of the difficulties with the Allington register.



- 3 In 1699 an inventory was made of the goods of William Pomory the Elder late of Allington. This was signed by Robert Pitfeild as appraiser.
- The will of Jeanne Pomory indicates that Robert Pitfold had five children alive in July 1667 and one was called Elizabeth. No christening of Elizabeth has been found. At the time Robert made his will in 1682 he named only three children Mary, Robert and Richard. In September 1677 at Allington Elizabeth and John Pitfold, son and daughter of Robert Pitfold were buried on the same day. Burials of this type are often of very young infants who didn't live (especially as in this case when there are no corresponding christenings). However I think this John and Elizabeth could have been older children of Robert Pitfold that may have died together as the result of illness, 10 years after Elizabeth was named in Jeanne Pomery's will.

As noted on the previous table it has been difficult to attribute children to the various Robert Pitfolds/Pitfield who lived in the parish of Allington. Christenings of some, but not all, of the children of Robert Pitfield (1663-1740) have been traced and the relationships of the siblings have been established by various wills and other sources. No marriage for Robert has been found and his wife's name is not shown for the christening of his children, but I think the Hannah Pitfield buried 1739 was his wife. A kinswoman Elizabeth Kayne is named by both Thomas and Samuel in their wills - it seems likely this Elizabeth was connected to their mother so Hannah's name may also have be Kavne.







In keeping with Robert's other bequests the property was to pass to Andrew's male heirs and if Andrew was to die without male heirs the property was to pass to Thomas Pitfolde, Robert's fifth son, and his male heirs and failing that to subsequent brothers and their male heirs.

...l give and bequeath unto Andrew my said son five pounds of lawful money of England that his late master Mr(?) William Ffrench of Saltashe in the County of Cornwall oweth me.....

This might give a clue to where the Pitfold family originated from before they settled in Allington - see section The Origins of the Pitfolds.

It is doubtful that Andrew inherited because he died in the same year as his father.

Andrew left a will in 1586 in which he described himself as a yeoman of the parish of Allington. His will stated that he was owed five hundred marks by his brother-in-law Mr George Wadham of Catherston Lewise of Andrew Pitfold. Andrew left eighty pounds from the debt to his brothers, whom he named as Richard Pitfolde, George Pitfolde, Robert Pitfolde, Thomas Pitfolde, John Pitfolde the elder, Henry Pitfolde, John Pitfolde the younger and Bastian Pitfolde with each to receive ten pounds.

The will was proved by Thomas Pitfolde brother, Robert Pitfolde father not proving.

See Table 0 for details of brothers and sister named by Andrew. His "sister in law Alice" was probably the wife of John Pitfolde the younger, whilst his "sister in law" Anne could have been the wife of either Robert or Thomas.

Mr John Wadham of Catherston, gentleman left a will made in January 1584

He left two hundred pounds to his daughter Mary Wadham and three hundred pounds to his daughter Margaret Wadham. The money was to be kept by his son George Wadham until the marriage of the said daughters.

He also named his sons John Wadham and Nicholas Wadham, his niece Anne Wadham, his brother Laurence Wadham and his sister Margaret Case. He also named several cousins.

Catherston Leweston was a manor within the parish of Whitchurch Canonicorum, owned by the Wadham family. John Wadham was buried in the church of Whitchurch Canonicorum which has a brass plaque engraved to his memory.

Here lieth John Wadham of Catherston, esquire, who deceased the XIVth day of March 1584 who was during his life time captain of the Queen's majesty's castle of Sandsfoot besides Weymouth in this county of Dorset and also recorder of Lyme Regis, whose soul God rest to his good will and pleasure Amen.

Although references to Thomas Pitfold (-1602) during his lifetime are scarce, information has been gained concerning him from the Inquisitions Post Mortem held after his death and that of his brother Sebastian. At the time of his death Thomas held quite a lot of land in Allington amongst which was a piece of land called Curtops. Curtops had been left by Robert Pitfold the father to his son Andrew but as Andrew did not inherit, the land passed to Thomas. Thomas left his lands to his brother Sebastian, although Sebastian bestowed a lifetimes interest on Curtops to Anne Pitfold, the widow of Thomas Pitfold. Thomas and Anne had no children and Anne was living in Colyton, Devon in 1615 (at the time of Sebastian Pitfold's Inquisition Post Mortem).

- 4 John Pitfold the Elder and John Pitfold the Younger, both sons of Robert Pitfold (1516-1586), were both of the parish of Allington. They both appear in tax records and parish records, where the suffix Elder and Younger were often used. However, in many cases, they are referred to just as John Pitfold, making it difficult to differentiate between the two. The only christening entry that names the father specifically as John Pitfold the Elder is that of Alice at Allington in 1597.
- After about 1602 the suffix Younger and Elder is no longer used, whilst a John Pitfold remains in the parishthis seems to imply one of the John's had died or moved away. My researches lead me to believe that John Pitfold the Elder died c1602, although no burial has been found. John Pitfold the Younger (c1586-1629) continued to live in Allington (see Table Dorset 9)

The will of Robert Pitfold of Allington, made in 1583 named his sons and their seniority. However he named John Pitfold the Elder as his sixth son, and Henry Pitfold as his eighth son, implying a seventh son had already died by this date. It has been impossible to find the name of the seventh son.


- 1 Henry Pitfold (1637) was named as the eighth son of Robert Pytfolde of Allington (c1516-1586) in the will that Robert made in 1583.
 - "...... I give and bequeathe unto Henry Pitfolde my sonne tenne pounds of Lawfull money of England whiche his Master hathe with him as a a????? During his apprenticehood......"
 - "......l give and bequeath unto Henry Pitfolde my sonne all my timber lying and growing uppon my bargayne at Combe(?) and all my timber lying uppon Grentas(?) grounds...."

In 1594 Henry married Joan Herne at Netherbury, Dorset. The Hernes were a prominent family in the parish of Netherbury and it is likely that Joan would have had a large dowry.

GOMELSHAY/GUMMERSHAY, WHITCHURCH CANONICORUM

- 2 Henry settled on a tenement and land called Gomelshay. Henry's older brother Richard Pitfold (-1597) Dorset 1 described himself as "of Gomelshay" when he made his will in 1597 and another brother George Pitfold (-1618) Dorset 2 was described as "of Gomelshav" in a legal dispute circa 1599.
 - Gomelshay was part of the Manor of Wootton Abbas, within the parish of Whitchurch Canonicorum. Unfortunately records of the Manor have not survived. During this period it was commonplace for leases to be issued for a number of "lives" often worded "for the term of their lives successfully". It seems likely that the three brothers purchased a lease on Gomelshay, from the Manor, on their three lives. A price would have been paid when the lease was taken out and the lessees would pay a yearly rent, until such time as the last of them died, when the premises would revert back to the Manor. Richard died in 1597 and George died in 1618, leaving Henry as the sole lessee. This type of lease was known as copyhold tenure and took its name from the fact that the "title deed" received by the tenant was a copy of the relevant entry in the manorial court roll. A tenant or mesne lord who held land in this way was legally known as a copyholder.
- 3 Henry and Joan had five children who survived to adulthood as shown on the table. In 1659 Charles Pitfield (-1660), the youngest son of Henry and Joan, took legal action against his older brother Henry Pitfield (-1683), and Mary, Henry's wife. (C7/445/62 National Archives). This case, along with other sources, gives some information about the continuing connection that the Pitfold/Pitfield family had with Gomelshav.
- According to the statements made in this case Henry Pitfield, the father (i.e. Henry Pitfold -1637), was in his lifetime seized of two tenements from the Manor of Wootton Abbas, one of which was Gomelshay (the other tenement is not named). Henry negotiated with the Manor and paid to have his eldest son Henry added to the lease as an addition "life" and in so doing put himself in a great deal of debt. When Henry the father died in 1637 most of the debt was outstanding and he had not left suitable provision for his son Henry. As was the custom Joan Pitfold/Pitfield, as the widow of the last lessee, was allowed to continue to live at Gomelshay. Joan Pitfold, widow and copyholder, is listed as paying taxes at Whitchurch in 1641. Joan, and Henry her son, worked the land, and Joan used some of her own personal wealth, to pay off the debts of Henry the father. Charles makes the case that by clearing the debt and making the property profitable Joan, and Henry the son, were able to improve Henry's prospects of making a "good" marriage. He further said that Henry the son had promised to pay back the money that his mother, Joan, had paid out and to pay Charles £100, when a suitable marriage took place. From other sources it is known that Henry Pitfield, the son, married around 1639 to Mary Long the daughter of Thomas Long of Kingston, Somerset. See Note 12. Charles alleges that Henry received £300 as a result of the marriage and he should have paid the £100 promised to Charles and made a payment to their mother Joan. Henry replied that he did not receive any money at the time of the marriage but that it was true that Mary had received a sum of £300 some years after the marriage took place (inherited from her father?). Charles also complained that Henry the son, and his wife Mary, had the good fortune of living at Gomelshay and having Henry's mother Joan there to help them to raise their children.
- Joan Pitfield made a will in 1652, where she described herself as "of Gomelshay" and died in 1654 see note 13.
- The answer of Henry (-1683) & Mary (-1686) Pitfield to the bill of complaint of Charles Pitfield (-1660) was drawn up in the parish of Colaton Raleigh, Devon and was signed and dated January 1659, by John Pitfield senior and William Pitfield. John Pitfield senior of Colaton Raleigh (-1661) was the first cousin of Henry Pitfield (-1683) and is shown on Dorset 9.3 along with John's son William Pitfield (-1712)
- 7 It seems that the case of 1659 did not proceed as the plaintiff, Charles Pitfield, died in 1660, after having made a will in 1659 see note 17.
- 8 It would seem Henry and Mary Pitfield remained as tenants of Gomelshay until their deaths and that their son, another Henry Pitfield (1644-1710), came into the tenure in turn. A case of 1704 (C8/466/110 National Archives) states that John Henley is the Lord of the Manor of Wootton Abbas and that Henry Pitfield of Gomelshay yeoman, is one of the copyhold tenants of the said manor and has committed and suffered great waste and dilapidation upon his copyhold messuages and tenement. I do not know what the outcome of this case was but it is possible that Henry could have lost the copyhold of the property by not keeping it in good order.
- 9 This third Henry of Gomelshay died in 1710 and was succeeded by another Henry (-1716). It is not known if this Henry had the copyhold of Gomelshay. He died only six years after his father and this family line died out with him.

There is still a GUMMERSHAY FARM in Whitchurch Canonicorum today.





18 In 1687 a case was bought by Richard Pitfield (complainant) against Henry Pitfield (defendant) - in dispute the will of Charles Pitfield made 1659. Depositions from the case (C22/153/3 - National Archives) show that Richard Pitfield was the son of Robert Pitfield whilst Henry Pitfield was the son of Henry Pitfield. The depositions further show that Henry the Elder and Robert were brothers of the late Charles and that the three brothers were the sons of Henry Pitfield and Joan Pitfield. Also named was John Tucker, brother-in-law of the complainant.

Depositions also show that Mary the sister of Henry Pitfield, the defendant was married to John Smith. The depositions also show that Robert Pitfield, the father of the plaintiff, was at the time of his death married to Hannah Hallett (aged 30 or upwards in 1686) and that Hannah had remarried to Mathew Wade of Symondsbury, yeoman.

The Jenkins family farmed Innsacre until the 1750s.

The Manor of Shipton had been owned by the Strangeways family, who later became the Earls of Illchester, since the time of the Civil War and remained the property of the family until it was broken up and sold in 1910. Shipton Gorge was a chapelry within the parish of Burton Bradstock. Innsacre Farm House, which still exists, is close to the church at Shipton.



- Christening at Powerstock in 1712 of Richard, son of Joseph and Joan Pitfield is possibly an incorrect entry and the father's name should be John. Alternatively Richard could have been the son of Joseph Pitfield and a wife. Joan, before Joseph's marriage to Lucretia Hunt in 1718 - see table Dorset 8.1.1.1
- A document dated 1769 refers to Greenway Cottage, Shipton Gorge said to have been built by Henry Pitfield, deceased, the father of Rebecca Greening, widow, deceased of Shipton Gorge, who left it to her son John Greening of Marylebone, London.
- Simon Jenkins of Innsacre left a will made 1721 in which he named his wife Flizabeth and 3 children The will was witnessed by John Pitfield and Joseph Pitfield who both signed.

- John Pitfield left a will made 1733 with a codical 1738.

Within the will John refers to his "nephews" and "nieces" that he had earlier referred to as "cousins."

In his will, made 1733, John mentions four brothers-in-law - William Nicholls (deceased), William Greening, Thomas Brown and Richard Tucker, but he does not give the names of their spouses (presumably his sisters). It is known that John's sister Hannah was married to William Nicholls. Research has led me to believe that:

William Greening was of the chapelry of Shipton Gorge in Burton Bradstock and was married to Rebecca.

Richard Tucker was of the parish of Loders and was married to Edith.

Thomas Brown was of the parish of Bradpole and was married to Mary.

I have not been able to trace the baptisms for a Rebecca Pitfield, Edith Pitfield or Mary Pitfield, as daughters of Henry and Elizabeth Pitfield, but if they were baptised at Burton Bradstock then the registers are in poor condition, with many gaps. I have also been unable to trace the marriages of William Greening, Thomas Brown or Richard Tucker.

It is possible either Greening. Brown or Tucker was the maiden name of Joan, wife of John (1673-1739) so one of the brothers-in-laws named could have been Joan's brother.

Monumental Inscriptions at Netherbury

Elizabeth daughter of John and Joan Pitfield died 12th April 1736 also Ann daughter of John and Joan 1738.

Joseph son of John and Joan Pitfield died 27th Nov. 1734 aged 24 years, also Joan wife of John Pitfield 1736.

John Pitfield died 28th Nov.1739 aged 67 years.

I have no definite proof that Richard Pitfield of Powerstock (-1732) was another son of Henry and Elizabeth, but think it is most likely. The only references I have to him are shown here



3 John Pitfield, 1721-1787, was admitted into the Freedom of the City of London, in 4 February 1743/44, by redemption, in the Company of Wax Chandler's by paying a fee of forty six shillings and eight pence.

The next mention of John (1721-1787) is in 1748 in a document relating to a cottage in Burton Bradstock which is said to have belonged jointly to Lucretia Pitfield of Frampton a widow, and her son John, then living in London, and employed as a coal meter.

A coal meter was a position that only occurred in London - its holder was responsible for checking the weights and quantity of coal released from coal merchants. John appears to have held the position until his death.

John Pitfield made a will in 1787

THE PITFIELD FAMILY OF MANGERTON, SYMONDSBURY AND EYPE.

This narrative gives some further information concerning the Pitfield family who owned land at Mangerton in Netherbury and who went on to become major landowners in the parish of Symondsbury and Symondsbury's chapelry Eype. It helps explain how the various properties were passed down through members of the family and it needs to be read in conjunction with most of the tables that start with 8.

Some of these notes are repeated within the charts, whilst other notes on the charts add to this narrative with further information such as prećis of wills etc. Persons named in this narrative have the symbol of against their names in the charts.

John Pitfield of Mangerton (1673-1739)

In his will John Pitfield, (1673-1739), described himself as a yeoman of Mangerton, a hamlet within the parish of Netherbury. I have been unable to establish when John Pitfield purchased land at Mangerton but it was probably sometime after 1713, as John and his wife Joan had been living at Powerstock before that date. Various members of the Pitfield family continued to own land at Mangerton until 1838.

John Pitfield (1673-1739) also owned lands within the parish of Burton Bradstock and its chapelry Shipton Gorge, some of which he probably inherited from his father Henry Pitfield of Innsacre, Shipton Gorge (c1643-1720).

John Pitfield (1673-1739) died childless. In his will he left his lands in Burton Bradstock and Shipton Gorge to his nephew John Greening, the son of his sister Rebecca Greening neé Pitfield. He left Mangerton in trust to his two nephews Jacob Pitfield (1723-1795) and Joseph Pitfield (1727-1783), sons of his brother Joseph Pitfield of Stratton (-1743), until they each reached the age of 21.

Jacob Pitfield of Symondsbury (1723-1795) and Joseph Pitfield of Banbury (1727-1783)

Jacob Pitfield (1723-1795) became the new owner of Mangerton Farm, whilst his brother Joseph (1727-1783) settled at Banbury, Oxfordshire where he was a shag merchant (dealer in tobacco). At the time of making his will Joseph Pitfield (1727-1783) described himself as a Gentleman, and he owned land and property in Isleworth, Middlesex and in the Dorset parishes of Burton Bradstock, Whitchurch Canonicorum and Sydling Saint Nicholas. He instructed his executors to sell his property to pay off his debts and to provide an income for his wife Ann and any child or children that succeeded him. Joseph and Ann had one daughter Ann Pitfield (1778-1822). Following the death of her mother in 1786 Ann Pitfield (1778-1822) became an orphan, aged 8, and it is likely she was bought up by her uncle Jacob Pitfield (1723-1795).

The churchwarden's accounts of Netherbury for the years 1756 and 1762 refer to "Mangerton Farm divided." Jacob Pitfield owned one parcel of land of 71/2 acres and another of 6 acres. 51/2 acres were owned by George Waldron, 14 acres by George Stevens, 7 acres by George Symes esq, 4 acres by John Hine and 3/4 of an acre by James Munden.

The land tax records for the year 1795 list Jacob Pitfield as the proprietor of land in the parish of Netherbury. The name and the extent of the land is not given, but it seems to have been considerably more than the $13^{1/2}$ acres he owned in 1762, as he paid £4 10s 11d in land tax. The tenant of the land in 1795 was Benjamin Stoodley.

Jacob Pitfield (1723-1795) was married twice and had 16 children, 11 who survived infancy, as shown on tables 3.1.1.1.1a and 3.1.1.1.1b. As well as being the owner of land at Mangerton, Jacob occupied extensive lands within the parish of Symondsbury. Tithe records for Symondsbury show that from 1750 Jacob Pitfield was present at Symondsbury Farm, an extensive property. The land tax records, which start in 1782, show that Jacob was the tenant of Symondsbury Farm, with the property being owned by Francis J Brown esg. In addition Jacob occupied six other pieces of land in Symondsbury, although he was not the owner of any of them. By 1790 Jacob's son John Pitfield (1770-1838) had taken over the tenancy of some land from his father, as well as renting further land in the parish. Jacob had become the owner and occupier of a piece of land in Lower Eype (a chapelry of Symondsbury). In 1795, the year in which Jacob died. he is listed as the owner and occupier of North End and Cussen's North End as well as the piece of land in Evpe. In the same year his sons Jacob Pitfield junior (1769-1799) and John Pitfield (1770-1838) are both listed as occupying land in the parish.

Jacob Pitfield of Symondsbury (1723-1795) left a will in which he left "Mangerton Farm" to his wife Joan and upon her death to his son Thomas Pitfield (1778-1858). All his lands and tenements that he still owned in Symondsbury he left to his son John Pitfield (1770-1838). He also referred to using £1,300, left in trust to his niece Ann Pitfield (1778-1822) by his late brother Joseph Pitfield (1727-1783), which he used to buy a farm within Symondsbury called North End (listed in the land records of 1795 above) which was to be transferred to Ann upon his death.

Thomas Pitfield (1778-1822) and Ann Pitfield (1778-1822)

Thomas Pitfield (1778-1858), one of the sons of Jacob Pitfield (1723-1795), married his first cousin Ann Pitfield (1788-1822), the daughter of Joseph Pitfield of Banbury (1727-1783), in 1799 at Netherbury.

Ann sold her lands at North End to Thomas's brother John Pitfield

(1770-1838) and Thomas and Ann lived at Mangerton Farm, which Thomas had inherited from his father Jacob Pitfield (1723-1795). Thomas and Ann had one son John Pitfield (1800-1854) and seven daughters. Ann died in 1822 and in 1829 "Thomas Pitfield of Mangerton Farm" advertised in the Dorset County Chronicle an auction for the sale of all his animals, farm implements, machines and wagons etc as he was "about to decline business". Thomas sold the Mangerton Farm to his brother John Pitfield (1770-1838). The 1831 Dorset Poll Book lists John Pitfield as the freeholder of Mangerton Farm and John Nicholls as the occupier. For details of what happened to Mangerton Farm see the section below about John Pitfield (1770-1838).

At the time of the 1841 census Thomas Pitfield (1778-1858) was living along with his daughter Susan Pitfield (1816-1855) in the household of Thomas's daughter Elizabeth Nicholls neé Pitfield and her husband John Nicholls, who were farming at Hincknowle in the parish of Netherbury.

At the time of the 1851 Susan Pitfield was a governess in the parish of Compton Valence. I have been unable to find Thomas in the 1851 census but at the time of his burial in 1858 he was described as of the parish of Stratton, Dorset. It is possible that Thomas Pitfield was living at Stratton Farm House, the farm of William Chick - brother to Thomas Chick who had married Sarah Pitfield. In 1851 Sarah Chick, widow, was living in William Chick's household with two children and Mary Pitfield (1806-1860) was a visitor there.

Jacob Pitfield, junior (1769-1799)

Jacob Pitfield junior died in 1799, only four years after his father, and his wife Elizabeth died the same year leaving three young children. It is unclear who cared for the children but they all survived into adulthood, with the daughters Elizabeth Horner Pitfield (1792-) and Lucretia Pitfield (1794-) making good marriages and the son Jacob Pitfield (1796-1860) making a successful career in the Royal Navy (see below and the separate narrative).

John Pitfield of Symondsbury (1770-1838)

As already seen John Pitfield (1770-1838) took over the tenancy of some of the Symondsbury properties occupied by his father Jacob Pitfield (1723-1795) whilst in his early 20s, and was left the land that

continued from previous

his father owned in Eype. Additionally, as already seen, John purchased Mangerton Farm from his cousin Ann Pitfield (1778-1822) soon after she became its owner in 1795. John also took over the tenancy of the lands that his brother Jacob had been renting at the time of his death in 1799.

In 1802 John Pitfield owned and occupied pieces of land called North End, Cussen's North End, Dommets, Part of Davies and Honeylands, all in the parish of Symondsbury. He also occupied and rented Symondsbury Farm from Francis J Brown and ten other pieces of land, from various owners.

In 1805 John is listed as owning and occupying Symondsbury Farm (55 years after his father first became its tenant) as well as two other pieces of land, previously rented from Francis J Brown. He also owned and occupied a further piece of land that he had not occupied in 1803, as well as occupying the other lands as listed in 1803.

In 1814 John Pitfield was the owner and occupier of the majority of the property that he either occupied or occupied and owned in 1805. In addition he rented six further properties from the Honourable S. D. Strangeways (Earl of Ilchester).

In the years that follow John's land holdings in Symondsbury remained largely unchanged. In 1832 a new acquisition is listed in the land tax records - land called Rayerhill – that is owned by "John Pitfield senior" (1770-1838) but occupied by his nephew, listed as "John Pitfield junior" (1800-1854), the son of Thomas Pitfield (1788-1858) and Ann Pitfield (1778-1822).

The Land Tax records finish in 1832 but the tithe records show that from 1831-1834 John Pitfield paid tithes on the properties that are listed in the land tax records.

In 1834 John Pitfield transferred much of his land to John Pope by an indenture for 21 years. John Pope was married to the niece of John Pitfield - Jane Warr the daughter of John's sister Jenny Pitfield/Warr and John Warr. The Church Rate and Vestry minute book for 1835 shows that the lands that had been owned and occupied by John Pitfield were divided between John Pope and John Pitfield Junior, whilst John Pitfield senior didn't pay any church rate.

In 1835 John Pope paid church rates for Symondsbury Farm, North Ends, Henwood, Leazeacre, Dommetts, Bilkshay, Newport, Raines Hill and Leggs all in Symonsbury North Tithing. He also paid church rates for Mile's Cross, Honeylands, Symes's, Hare's, Gale's in Symondsbury South Tithing.

In 1835 John Pitfield paid tithes for: Watton Farm at Eype, Flood and Lotts part Lower Eype, Lord Role's part Lower Eype, Late John Davis's, Shoots, Land in Great Meadow, Late Demziloes (?), Farthing

Field and Youngs, all in Symondsbury South Tithing.

John Pitfield, senior made a will in 1835 in which he made some specific legacies to various members of his family – see précis of his will on Table 3.1.1.1.1b – with the majority of his estate being put in trust for his great nephew John Pitfield, son of his nephew John Pitfield (1800-1854) (son of Thomas Pitfield and Ann Pitfield) until he reached the aged of 21. The will made provision that if John Pitfield, the great nephew did not reach 21 then the trust would revert to any other son of John Pitfield the nephew, who lived to 21. At the time John made his will in 1835 his great nephew John was aged one year and he died the following year. In the same year, 1836, another son also named John, was born to John Pitfield the nephew, who in time became the main beneficiary of his great uncle's estate. The will also refers to the Indenture of 1834 transferring some of his lands to John Pope for a period of 21 years.

John Pitfield (1770-1838) never married and was buried at Symondsbury, where there is an elaborate marble plaque within the church testifying to his virtues, erected by his executors Jacob Pitfield, John Pitfield and John Pope.

Jacob Pitfield (1796-1860), named as an executor, was one of John Pitfield's nephews, being the son of John's brother Jacob Pitfield (1769-1799). For details of the life and Royal Navy career of Jacob Pitfield see the seperate narrative.

Soon after the death of John Pitfield (1770-1838) John Pitfield and John Pope auctioned Mangerton Farm in Netherbury which was described thus:

The Fee-Simple and Inheritance of all that compact and desirable FARM, called Mangerton, consisting of an excellent Dwelling-House, beautifully situated, within a Curtilage, productive Garden, Barn, Stables, and other convenient Outbuildings, and seventy-two acres of rich, Arable, Meadow, and Pasture Land and Orchard, thereto belonging, now in the occupation of Mr. John S Nichols, as tenant from year to year, situate in the parish of Netherbury, and county of Dorset, about two miles and a half from Bridport and four from Beaminster, close to an excellent turnpike road, and in the neighbourhood of good markets.

(Dorset County Chronicle 26 April 1838)

Pitfold Farm, in the parish of Burton Bradstock, was also offered for sale at the same auction in 1838 – for details of Pitfold Farm see separate narrative.

John Pope and John Pitfield also sold off other pieces of land in Symondsbury.

As already seen the land and property holdings of John Pitfield were split, three years before his death. The story of what happened to the two parts of his estate follow different but sometimes overlapping narratives.

Eype

John Pitfield junior, (1800-1854) known as John Pitfield of Eype continued to farm at Eype from when he first occupied land there in 1835. He had married in 1832 to Jane Roper. In the 1851 census John was living at Higher Eype and was described as a farmer of 400 acres employing 25 labourers. Listed with him were his wife and six sons. John died in 1854 and the records show that his widow Jane took over the farm and continued to pay church rates in the years that followed. In 1861 Jane Pitfield is listed as the head of the household at Higher Eype and is described as a farmer of 592 acres employing 23 men, 9 boys and 7 women. In the house with her were her sons John aged 24, Alfred aged 21, George aged 15 and Joseph aged 13.

Her son John Pitfield (1836-1913) married in 1861 - more details of John are shown in the next section.

From 1864 to 1870 Jane Pitfield and Alfred Pitfield both paid church rates with Jane paying the most, indicating she was still running the farm at Eype. However at the time of the 1871 census Alfred J Pitfield, unmarried, is listed as the head of the household at Higher Evpe, farming 596 acres employing 27 men, 7 boys and 8 women. His mother Jane and his brother Joseph are also living at the farm. Alfred Pitfield pays the church rate until 1878. Alfred had married in 1875 and he appears to have moved away around 1878, soon after his mother Jane died in 1877, and is listed as farming in Wimbledon, Surrey at the time of the 1881 census. Alfred's place at Higher Eype is taken over by his brother George Roper Pitfield who is listed at the time of the 1881 census as George Pitfield, unmarried, aged 35, farmer of 504 acres employing 15 men 5 boys and 3 women. George Roper Pitfield continued to farm at Higher Eype and married in 1890. In the 1891 census he is listed, with his wife Lillian, as a farmer (the 1891 census gives no detail of landholdings etc), and the couple are still there for the 1901 census.

In September 1901 George Roper Pitfield puts all his livestock, farming machinery and agricultural implements up for sale at Eype as he is quitting farming – *Western Gazette 20th September 1901*.

George and Lillian retired to Wroath Grange in the parish of Netherbury, thus ending the Pitfield connection with the parish of Symondsbury).

Symondsbury Farm

As outlined previously much of the estate of John Pitfield senior (1770-1838) was left to his great nephew John Pitfield (1836-1913) in

continued from previous

trust until he reached the aged of 21, whilst at the same time making provision for John Pope to occupy it from 1834 for a period of 21 years.

John Pope farmed and paid church rates for Symondsbury Farm from 1835 until 1855. At the time of the 1851 census he is listed in Symondsbury Village with his wife, son and daughter and described as a farmer of 750 acres employing 30 labourers.

By 1856 John Pope had vacated Symonsbury Farm (presumably at the end of his 21 year tenure) and from 1856 to 1857 it is occupied by John Symonds and from 1858 to 1861 by George Symonds. John Symonds was the uncle of John Pitfield of Eype's wife (now widow) Jane Roper. George Symonds was the son of John Symonds and therefore the cousin of Jane Roper/Pitfield (see chart on next page). John Pope continued farming other land in Symondsbury.

John Pitfield (1834-1913) the great nephew had been living at Eype with his parents and later with his mother, as outlined in the previous section about Eype. In 1861 he married Mary-Ann Udal, the daughter of William Udal. William Udal was a cousin of Jane Roper/Pitfield of Eype (see chart on next table) and had his roots in Dorset, but had made a sizeable fortune in business in Birmingham.

Soon after his marriage John and Mary-Ann took over Symondsbury Farm and John paid church rates from 1861 to 1877. At the time of the 1871 census John and Marianne (sic) are listed at Symondsbury Village with 7 children. John is described as a landowner of 580 acres employing 20 men and 7 boys.

John Pitfield (1836-1913) appears to have given up the farm around 1877 as from 1877 to 1880 the church rate is paid by brother-in-law William Udal Junior.

In 1881 John Pitfield and his family are living in Taunton, Somerset where he is described as a retired farmer. He later moved to Elmset Hall, Wedmore, Axminster, Somerset and then to Wrafton House, Heanton Punchardon, Devon, where he died 1913.

Following the death of William Udal senior in 1880 his son, John Symonds Udal (brother to John's wife Jane Udal) purchased Symondsbury Farm from John Pitfield in 1881. John Symonds Udal owned Symondsbury Farm and lived in the farmhouse, whilst his cousin Daniel John Symonds occupied the farmland (see table on next page). John Symonds Udal sold the "Symondsbury Estate" in 1900 to the Colfox family who still own it today.

PITFOLD FARM, BURTON BRADSTOCK

In 1783 the land tax records list Joseph Pitfield as the owner of land in the parish of Burton Bradstock, occupied by Robert Greening on which 1 pound, 11 shillings and 8 pence tax was paid. No name is given for the piece of land. In 1784 and 1785 Mrs Pitfield is named as the owner and in 1786 the owner is the "executors of Mr Joseph" Pitfield" with the tenant being Stephen Ackerman. This Joseph Pitfield was Joseph of Banbury (1727-1783) shown on Table 3.1.1.1. In his will Joseph stated that he owned land in Burton Bradstock (and elsewhere) and that his lands should be sold to provide an income for his wife and any child or children that might succeed him. The land at Burton Bradstock appears to have transferred to Joseph's brother Jacob Pitfield (1723-1795) as the land tax records list either Mr Pitfield or Mr Jacob Pitfield as the owner from 1787-1795. After the death of Jacob the Burton Bradstock land is owned by his son Thomas Pitfield (1778-1858) with the occupier still Stephen Ackerman, until 1813. From 1815 until 1818 Thomas Pitfield is listed as the owner and occupier of the land. Although Thomas was living and farming at Mangerton in the parish of Netherbury it is quite possible that he could have farmed the land in Burton Bradstock as well, as it is not far from Mangerton. From 1820 to 1829 Thomas Pitfield is still listed as the proprietor, although the occupier is not listed. The piece of land is now listed as "Pitfields" and the tax paid is still 1 pound, 11 shillings and 8 pence. The records for 1830 until 1832 (the last year for land tax records) list the land as "Pitfolds" and give the proprietor and occupier as Thomas Pitfield.

It was quite common for land to be named after a one-time owner. The naming of the farm as "Pitfolds" seems to imply that the land had been owned by the Pitfield family from far earlier times, when the surname was still Pitfold. It is known that the "Pitfold" family lived in the parish of Burton Bradstock from early on, with George Pitfold (-1618) being buried in the parish. It is likely that Pitfold Farm (which still exists today in Burton Bradstock) took its name from an early member of the Pitfield/Pitfold family. There are deeds from the Pitt-Rivers family estate archive relating to Pitfold Tenement 1742 and Pitfold Farm 1789, which I have not yet seen. The Pitt-Rivers family became Lords of the Manor of Burton Bradstock when George Pitt acquired it in 1684.

After 1832 Thomas Pitfield appears to give up Pitfold Farm. It's possible that he sold it to his brother John Pitfiled (1770-1838) at the same time as he gave up Mangerton Farm (circa 1832). The farm is then taken over by John Pitfield (1800-1854) the son of Thomas. This possibly occurred around 1835 when John Pitfield (1770-1838)

passed on much of his Symondsbury land to John Pitfield (1800-1854) and to John Pope (1803-1873) – see THE PITFIELD FAMILY OF MANGERTON, SYMONDSBURY AND EYPE.

In April 1838, two months after the death of John Pitfield (1770-1854), "Mangerton & Pitfold's Farms and other lands" were advertised for sale by John Pitfield and John Pope (Dorset County Chronicle, 26th April 1838). Pitfold's Farm was described as:


LOT 2 – All that TENEMENT or FARM, called Pitfolds, with the House, Stables, Barn, Outbuildings, and other convenient Offices thereon, and the following closes of rich Arable, Meadow and Pasture land, hereinafter set forth, situate in the parish of Burton Bradstock, and county of Dorset, containing altogether about 104 Acres, in the occupation of Mr. T. Clark, as tenant, at a yearly Rent of £130, whose term will expire at Michaelmas, 1839.

(there then follow as breakdown of the various closes, meadows and pieces of arable land and their names and acerage).

The same lot also included other lands within Burton Bradstock amounting to 46 acres. The sale seemed to be for the remaining leaseholds on the lands, rather than for the freehold.

The tithe records for 1839 show the same pieces of land from the advertisement as being owned by John Pitfield and Lord Rivers and occupied by John Pitfield. The tithe records seem to imply that Pitt-Rivers owned the Freehold and John Pitfield owned the leasehold of Pitfold farm and the other property within Burton Bradstock. The tithe map shows Pitfold Farm as being in the far north of the Burton Bradstock bordering the parish of Bothenhampton.

Captain George Henry Lane Fox-Pitt-Rivers sold the whole of the Burton Bradstock estate, including all the houses and cottages in the village, in 1958. Most properties were sold to existing tenants. Pitfold Farm, consisting of 84 acres and including most of the field names that appeared in the 1838 advertisement, was one of the auction lots in the 1958 sale.

From 1786 until 1789 he rented Buckland Farm in the parish of Broadway, proprietor Lionel Damer Esq, plus further land from Mr Coker, the rector of Buckland.

In 1802 he is listed as proprietor and occupier of a modest farm in the parish of Toller Porcorum. From 1804 he is listed as the proprietor of land in Toller Porcorum occupied by Joseph Weller. It is likely he moved to Toller Porcorum in 1790 as his son John was christened there in 1791.

From 1813 he is listed as the proprietor of land called Hulls, in Toller Porcorum, which is occupied by Ezekiel Pope. In 1832 (the last year for land tax returns) he still owns Hulls, which is occupied by John Keech.

The 1844 Tithe records list Joseph Pitfield as the owner of land in excess of 65 acres in Toller Porcorum, occupied by John Saunders. This was three years after the death of Joseph Pitfield but was fairly common for the tithe records to list a deceased person as the owner of land, or the record could refer to Joseph Pitfield junior (1788-1858).



JACOB PITFIELD 1796-

Jacob Pitfield joined the Royal Navy as a Volunteer 2nd class aboard H.M.S. Centaur in September 1809. He served in the Mediterranean until August 1811 aboard the ships Centaur, Hibernia & Tigre. From September 1811-June 1815 Jacob served aboard H.H.S. Pheasant as a Volunteer 2nd class. Midshipman and Master's Mate in the Western Isles, Home Station and in Newfoundland. He was a Midshipman from June-August 1815 aboard H.M.S. Podargus on the Home Station and as Master's Mate on the same ship at St. Helena from August-December 1816. From December 1816-March 1817 he was a Midshipman aboard H.M.S. Orantes on passage home to prepare at Naval College, Chatham for his Lieutenant's examinations. He passed as a Lieutenant in June 1817 but was not commissioned immediately. Jacob served as Master's Mate from April 1818-January 1821 aboard H.M.S. Bulwark in the Mediterranean and from January 1821 to February 1824 on H.M.S. Seringapatam in the Mediterranean and West Indies where the ship was employed in the search for pirates around Cuba. As H.M.S. Seringapatam was being paid off in February 1824 Jacob was recommended for promotion by Sir Samuel Warren, under whom he had served for six years. He served as Midshipman and Mate aboard H.M.S. Maidstone from March-September 1827 off the coast of Africa, during which time the ship captured two brigs with slaves on board bound for Brazil. In September 1824 Jacob was finally granted a commission and served as Lieutenant aboard H.M.S. Bann, a 20 gun sloop, but was paid off at Chatham in June 1825. His next posting was in December 1826 when he joined H.M.S. Ramillies, 74 guns, under Captain Hugh Pigot, as supernumary Lieutenant, on the Downs Station. He served three years on Ramillies, employed on the coastal blockade of Kent. During this time he married Arabella Prickett, a St. Margaret-at-Cliffe (nr. Dover) in 1827. The marriage entry states that Jacob Pitfield was of the parish of Ringwould, close to Dover. Jacob was paid off from Ramillies in January 1830. In December 1830 he joined the Coast Guard as a Lieutenant and served for eight years, until July 1838, at Saltburn and on the east coast of Yorkshire.

In 1841 Jacob and Arabella Pitfield were living in a cottage in Symondsbury - Jacob's occupation was given as Lieutenant Royal Navy, half pay.

JOSEPH EDWARD CHILCOTT PITFIELD 1788-1858

Joseph Edward Chilcott Pitfield was christened in 1788 at Buckland Ripers, Dorset, son of Joseph and Mary Pitfield of Frampton, Buckland Ripers and Symondsbury. Joseph joined the Royal Navy in 1807, two years after the Battle of Trafalgar but at a time when England was still at war against Napoleon. Joseph's first posting was as Master's Mate aboard HMS Prosperine, a 45 gun frigate under the command of Captain Charles Otter. At the beginning of 1809 Prosperine was stationed off the port of Toulon in the Mediterranean, to watch the movements of the French fleet. On the 27th February the two 40 gun frigates Penelope and Pauline sailed out to chase Prosperine away. In the early hours of 28th February 1809 there was a brief engagement in which the Prosperine had two men killed and ten wounded before she surrendered to the French frigates and her crew taken prisoner.

Joseph was held prisoner at the French fort at Verdun, where all naval offers were held, as well as English citizens from all parts of France who had been detained at the outbreak of war, known as *détenus*. The gentlemen prisoners were not kept closely confined, and were able to take lodgings in the town and come and go about the town and take walks in the country of up to three miles away, if they had obtained a permit to do so. Officers were held under parole and gave their word not to escape and were paid a "wage" by their captors.

There were a number of escapes from Verdun. Recaptured escapees could be sent to prisons elsewhere, where conditions were far harsher.

Joseph E. C. Pitfield remained a prisoner until he made his escape on the 21st December 1810, along with another Masters Mate by the name of David Littlejohn, of HMS Shannon. Unfortunately I have been unable to find out any details of Joseph's escape. Joseph must have made a fairly speeding return to England because on 9th March 1811 he joined HMS Boyne, under Captain Hanchett. His naval record shows he was discharged from HMS Proserpine the previous day – after serving for 3 years 4 months 1 week and 3 days. There is no mention of him being a prisoner of the French for about half of this period.

After returning to England Joseph served as Master's Mate aboard the ships Boyne, Ville de Paris and Impregnable in the English Channel until 1815. In November 1815 he was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant and was appointed to HMS Superb. During 1816 a squadron of ships, including Superb, set out to put an end to the trade in European slaves that was being conducted from Algiers. On 27th August 1816 a battle was fought in which the enemy fleet and much of the town of Algiers was destroyed. The Superb had eight men killed and 84 wounded. Joseph continued serving aboard HMS Superb in the Mediterranean until paid off in October 1818. His last appointment was in December 1820 aboard HMS Grasshopper at Portsmouth and Newfoundland, where he served for about twelve months. Joseph did not receive any further naval commissions and returned to Symondsbury where he continued to receive a Lieutenant's half pay from the Admiralty. In 1827 he married Amelia Stone neé Perham of Bothenhampton. In 1838 they were left a cottage called "Gales" in Symondsbury by Joseph's uncle John Pitfield (1770-1838) in his will. Joseph and Amelia continued living in Symondsbury. Amelia died in 1849 and Joseph died in 1858.




1 As outlined in THE PITFIELD FAMILY OF MANGERTON, SYMONDSBURY AND EYPE which appears between Table 8.1.1.1 and 8.1.1.1.1 Thomas Pitfield (1778-1858) married his first cousin Ann Pitfield (1788-1822).

Ann sold her lands at North End to Thomas's brother John Pitfield (1770-1838) and the couple settled on the farm at Mangerton that Thomas had inherited from his father Jacob Pitfield (1723-1795).

In 1829 Thomas Pitfield of Mangerton Farm advertised in the Dorset County Chronicle an auction for the sale of all his animals, farm implements, machines and wagons etc as he was "about to decline business". Thomas sold the farm to his brother John Pitfield (1770-1838). The 1831 Dorset Poll Book lists John Pitfield as the freeholder of Mangerton Farm and John Nicholls as the occupier. John Nicholls (c1804-) was the husband of Thomas's daughter Elizabeth. Upon the death of John Pitfield in 1838 Mangerton Farm, along with much other property in Symondsbury and Burton Bradstcock, was auctioned by John Pitfield of Eype (1800-1854) and John Pope, two of the beneficiaries under the will of John Pitfield (1770-1838). The farm was described as consisting of 72 acres and occupied by John S Nicholls. Mangerton farm was purchased by William Way esg.

At the time of the 1841 census Thomas Pitfield (1778-1858) and his daughter Susan Pitfield were living in the household of Elizabeth Nicholls neé Pitfield (another of Thomas's daughters) and her husband John Nicholls who were farming at Hincknowle in the parish of Netherbury.

At the time of the 1851 census Susan Pitfield was a governess in the parish of Compton Valence. I have been unable to find Thomas in the 1851 census but at the time of his burial in 1858 he was described as of the parish of Stratton, Dorset. It is possible that Thomas Pitfield was living at Stratton Farm House, the farm of William Chick's household with two children and Mary Pitfield (1806-1860) was a visitor there.

- Alfred John Pitfield vacated Eype Farm soon after the death of his mother Jane in 1877. In 1881 he was living in Wimbledon. Surrey where he was described as retired.
- Thomas John Pitfield passed his lawyers exams in 1864 and later became a partner in Lovell Son and Pitfield of Gray's Inn Road. London. The practice still exists today at the same address.
- Jacob Henry Pitfield cannot be located in the 1861 or 1871 census, but he married in 1871 and at the time of the 1881 census was a dairy farmer of 96 acres in Wimbledon, Surrey. Present in the household was his brother Joseph. Jacob Henry later farmed at Jessops. Penshurst, Kent.
- George Roper Pitfield was the last Pitfield occupier of Higher Eype Farm which he vacated in 1901.

The 8th Light Trench Mortar Battery, 8th Infantry Brigade, 5th Division, in which Victor was serving, was formed in France in July 1916, and was armed with eight 3 inch Stokes Mortars. Victor embarked on 13 October 1915 from Sydney, Australia on board a Commonwealth & Dominion Line Ltd (London) requisitioned vessel, the 7,243 ton H.M.A.T. Port Lincoln (A17). On 8 November 1916, having been evacuated from the Western Front, Victor was admitted to a Voluntary Aid Detachment Hospital at Shorncliffe. Kent, with severe shrapnel wounds to his back and abdominal wall. Almost two years later Victor was again evacuated from the battlefield having suffered more wounds, including a gunshot wound resulting in a compound fracture of the femur and was admitted to Rouen Hospital, France on the 30 September 1918, but succumbed to his wounds on 3 October 1918.







John Pitfold the Elder and John Pitfold the Younger, both sons of Robert Pitfold (1516-1586). were both of the parish of Allington. They both appear in tax records and parish records, where the suffix Elder and Younger were often used but in many cases, they are referred to just as John Pitfold, making it difficult to differentiate between the two. After about 1602 the suffix Younger and Elder is no longer used, whilst a John Pitfold remains in the parish - this seems to imply one of the John's had died or moved away. My researches lead me to believe that John Pitfold the Elder died c1602, although no burial has been found.

In 1588 a Sebastian Pitfold, the son of John Pitfold, was christened at Whitchurch Canonicorum. It has been difficult to establish which of the two John Pitfolds was the father of Sebastian but references, at a later date, point to him being the son of John Pitfold the Younger. It seems likely that John's wife was the Judith Pitfoldes who was buried at Whitchurch Canonicorum in 1592.

John married later in the year 1592 to Anne Souche (sic) at Colvton, Devon, John was described as of Lyme Regis whilst Anne was described as Gentlewomen. Anne was the daughter of Charles and Ursula Zouche. Charles Zouche was the brother of George La Zouche the 10th



Baron Harringworth (-1613) and the uncle of Edward La Zouche, 11th Baron (1556-1625) a member of the Privy Council and a Commissioner at the trial of Mary Queen of Scots, where he was the only one to speak out against the judgement and subsequent sentence of death. Charles Zouche was of the parish of Bloxworth, Dorset where two of his children were christened and it is likely he is the same Charles Souche (sic) who was buried at Bridport in 1613.

The Zouche family had extensive land holdings, with Charles Zouche owning a portion of Marsh Park in Wincanton, Somerset. In deeds pertaining to Marsh Park Charles Zouche is referred to as "gent of Shaftesbury, Dorset" in 1584, "of London" in 1586 and as "of Bradpole, Dorset" in 1596. It seems likely that Charles Zouche gave some of his lands in Wincanton to his daughter and son-in-law, possibly as a marriage settlement, as can be seen from the following reference.

Licence, for Charles Zouche, Ursula his wife, John Pitfolde and Anne his wife, to alienate the moiety of lands [details given] in Marshparke and Wyncaulton, Somt to Henry Wade. For 26s 8d paid to the queen's farmers under patent.

Henry Wade referred to was at that time the Lord of the Manor of Allington.

In 1599, at Symondsbury, Charles Pitfold, son of John Pitfold was christened. In 1663 Charles Pitfield stated that he was the son of John Pitfield of Allington and Anne Zouche - see further details Table 9.2. A daughter Margaret had been christened at Allington in 1597 and was buried at Bridport in 1603.



Although the christening of Margaret (1597) and Charles (1599) has been traced I have been unable to trace the christenings any other children of the couple. However, much later records (will of Charles Pitfield, 1599-1680; will of Robert Pitfield -1657; will of Richard Pitfield c1625-1653) show that Edith, Robert and Richard were siblings of Charles. I have shown Edith and Robert as being the children of Anne Zouche, and it is possible that the unnamed child of John Pitfold, christened in 1593, could have been either Edith or Robert. It is also possible that one or both of Robert and Edith were the children of Judith (-1592).

It seems that John's wife Anne died (although no burial has been found) because in 1604 John Pitfold married Priscilla Sydenham. Priscilla was the daughter of Thomas Sydenham Esq. baptised 1565 at Toller Fratrum. Thomas Sydenham had taken up residence at the Manor House at Wynford Eagle, a chapelry to the parish of Toller Fratrum, in 1550. At a later date the Sydenham family of Wynford Eagle were prominent soldiers, fighting for the parliamentary cause in the English Civil War.

It is likely Priscilla, who was aged 40 when she married, would have had a substantial dowry. John and Priscilla had one son born, John Pitfold, who was christened in his mother's parish of Wynford Eagle in 1605.


In 1619 the Duke of Buckingham, Lord High Admiral of England, commissioned a survey of all mariners, sailors and fishermen in South Devon, along with their ages and residence. A John Pittfolde, aged 50, was listed as a sailor in the parish of Woodbury and a John Pitfold, aged 50. was listed as a sailor in the parish of Withycombe Raleigh. This would give John a date of birth of circa 1569 - a good fit with his younger brother Sebastian Pitfold being born in 1570



It could be that John Pitfold was a mariner from a younger age, as he gave his residence at the time of his marriage in 1592 as "of Lyme Regis" - a seaport. At first sight being a sailor seems a strange occupation for the son of a yeoman farmer, who had married into at least two wealthy families. However, during the Elizabethan period, the New World and seafaring offered huge opportunities to those who could afford to take advantage of them. It could well be that John saw the chance for adventure and possible riches. Sebastian Pitfold (1570-1613), the younger brother of John Pitfold the Younger, was also a mariner (whilst also being described as a "Gentleman") and was the captain of a ship that made an abortive voyage in 1602 (see Dorset 10).

We have no details of John's career as a mariner and whether he made a good living.

John and Priscilla lived out their lives in the parish of Allington. Priscilla died in 1623 and it seems that John married for a fourth time - this is based on the fact that Richard Pitfield, who we know was the brother of Charles Pitfield (1599-1680) gave his aged as 22 in a deposition dated 1647, giving an age of birth of c1625. No record of a fourth marriage, or the christening of Richard, has been found. John Pitfold died in 1629 and he was succeeded in his land by his son Sebastian Pitfold (1588-).



Richard Pitfield, made a deposition in 1647 when he described himself as a merchant of St. Botoloph, Without Aldgate, London, aged 22.

References to Richard Pitfield are scarce but in 1649 Charles Pitfield, Esg., & Richard Pitfield, London, gent sold lands they owned within the Manor of Hawksbury, Fobbing, in the county of Essex. The reference states that Richard had purchased some of the land in the previous year. Earlier documents show that Charles Pitfield, gent of London, had purchased some of the lands at Hawkesbury in 1638 and further lands there in

It could be that Charles Pitfield, the half brother of Richard and being some 25 years his senior, acted as Richard's guardian, and helped him with the purchase and sale of lands at Hawkesbury - this is pure conjecture.

Richard made a nuncupative will in 1654 in the presence of Charles Pittfeild of Leonard Bromley in the county of Middx Esq and Mary Eastmond wife of George Eastmond of London Woollen Draper, in which he was described as a ship's chandler. All his estate was left to Charles Pitfield who he described as his brother. The will was proved by Alice Pitfield. Richard's relict.



- Sebastian Pitfold/Pitfield was the eldest son of John Pitfold the Younger (c1569-1629). Sebastian married in the parish of South Perrot, Dorset in 1620, to Rebecca Beaton, and the couple settled in the parish of Mudford, Somerset, where their first three children were christened. There were a number of Beaton families in the parish of Mudford at this time and it is possible that Rebecca was the daughter of Edward Beaton of Mudford. It is also possible that Sebastian Pitfold gained some landholding in the parish, at the time of his marriage, although I have no proof of this.
- 2 A Thomasine Beaton, widow of Mudford, made a will in 1639 in which she named one her godsons as John Pitfold.
- 3 Sebastian and Rebecca returned to Allington around 1630, following the death of Sebastian's father. A further two children were christened at Allington. In 1631 an indenture was drawn up between the Borough of Bridport and Sebastian Pitfolde of Athlington (Allington) yeoman in which "...John Pitfold, Edward Pitfold and Sebastain Pitfold, sons of the said Sebastain Pitfold..." are named.
- 4 Sebastian Pitfold is one of the jurors in legal cases in 1630 and 1632. He appears again in the Dorset Quarter Sessions records in 1638 when "Sebastian Pittfold, Allington, yeoman" is to "answer, keep peace at instance of Thomas Fulbrooke".
- 5 In 1641 Sebastian Pittfold and Richard Symes (more below) are both listed in the tax records at Allington as holding land in copyhold.
- 6 In 1642 all males over 18 were asked to make an oath of allegiance "to live and die for the true Protestant religion, the liberties and rights of subjects and the privilege of Parliaments." In the parish of Allington several Pitfold men made the oath, as did Richard Symes. Sebastian Pitfold had been appointed as one of the collectors or overseers of the oath and he signs his name clearly and with a flourish at the end of the returns.
- 7 In 1653, during the Commonwealth, a survey was made by Act of Parliament of "Certaine Messuage and Lands with the appurtes commonly called Magdalens Chantry Situate lying and being in Ashlington nigh Bridport in the County of Dorset Late ???? of the possessions of Charles Stuart late King of England" In establishing the geographical limits of the chantry the survey listed lands that bordered the chantry. Amongst these were lands owned by Sebastian Pittfold and Richard Symes.
- 8 In 1657 Richard Symes, yeoman of Allington, made a will "...I give and bequeath unto my sonne in lawe John Pitfeild (sic) one hundred and twenty pounds..." "...said sume of one hundred and twenty pounds is for and in lieu of his ???? with my daughter Joanne..." "...also I give unto my said sonne in lawe John Pitfold (sic) the sum of fifteen pound to be paid him within four years after my decease which sum is to be employed for the use and benefit of his three children..." Unfortunately Richard does not name the three children of John Pitfold/Pitfeild. The will also names two other daughters of Richard Symes, along with the names of their husbands, and a son Thomas Symes.
- 9 No burial of Sebastian or Rebecca Pitfold has been found. There is a gap in the burial records at Bridport between 1651 and 1660 - it was quite common for registers to be poorly kept during the Commonwealth period (although Bridport christenings)

- during the same period are well kept). It seems likely Sebastian Pitfold (1588-) died during the 1650s as his lands appear to be owned by his son, John in 1664 (see next note).
- 10 In 1664 John Pitfold, at Allington, was taxed for 7 hearths in the Hearth Tax imposed that year. This indicated he was the owner of substantial property. The £120 he had been left by his father in law in 1657 was a very large sum at that time.
- 11 In 1665 Thomazine Symes, widow of Allington (widow of Richard Symes) left a will "...Item I give unto Thomazine Pitfold daughter of John Pitfold one chest that was her grandfathers...."
- 12 Richard Symes married Tomazine Porter at Allington in 1636 but research seems to show that Tomazine was not the mother of Richard's children and that he had been previously married.
- References to John Pitfold (1623-) and his wife Joan are scarce it is known they had three children (names unknown) alive in 1657 and at least one child Thomazine alive in 1665 (who may have been one of the three). The only references in the parish records are of a son christened in 1656 (name unknown because of poor condition of register), the burial of a daughter Rebecca in 1666 and the christening of a daughter, Ann Pitfold, in 1669.
- 14 John of Allington died in 1677. It has been impossible to determine if he was succeeded by any of his children and it is not known what became of his land holdings.
- Edward Pitfold, the eldest son of Sebastian and Rebecca is listed in 1642 as a soldier, enlisted for the Parliamentary cause. Nothing further is known about Edward, so it is possible he did not survive the Civil War.
- 16 Sebastian (1625-1685), son of Sebastian (1588-) and Rebecca also declared for Parliament and had an interesting career as a clergyman under the Commonwealth - see the article alongside for more details.
- 17 Will of Sebastian Pitfield made 1686

- 19 The christening of Joseph Pitfield (-1696), who settled at Winfrith Newburgh, has not been found but various sources point to him being the son of Sebastian (1588-) and Rebecca.
- 20 In 1820 the Attorney General looked into the restoration of the Huntingdon Peerage and published "A Genealogical And Biographical History Of The Illustrious House Of Hastings" This showed that William Hastings, one of the grandsons of Henry Hastings of Woodlands, Dorset and a great-grandson of George Hastings, the Earl of Huntingdon, had married Rebecca Pitfield and the couple had one son Gabriel Hastings. The report also states that after the death of William Hastings, Rebecca married a Williard.
- 21 William Hastings made a will in 1666




22 I have no references to Robert Pitfold (1632-) the son of Sebastian and Rebecca, apart from his christening. He could have died young or there is a possibility that he could be one of the Robert Pitfold/Pitfield entries that I have shown on Dorset 3.1.

SEBASTIAN PITFIELD (SOLDIER, GRADUATE, CLERYMAN AND GHOST)

Because of the lack of records in the Civil War and Commonwealth periods, it is often a difficult era in which to gain details of one's ancestors. It is gratifying, therefore, when one can discover a lot about an interesting forebear, who lived through this time. Sebastian Pitfield was christened at Mudford in Somerset, the son of Rebecca (nee Beaton) and Sebastian Pitfield, alias Pitfold, a yeoman of Allington in Dorset. At the outbreak of the Civil War, Sebastian declared for Parliament. The minute book of the Dorset Standing Committee tells us that he served as a Quartermaster to a troop of horse under the command of Colonel Butler, the Governor of Wareham, from September 1644 until February 1645. From February 1645 until October 1645 he rode in the Sheriff's troop. The minute book gives interesting details of the rates of pay that Sebastian and his servant received, Sebastian only getting a corporal's pay while serving with the Sheriff. The next mention of Sebastian is in the records of Magdalen College, Oxford, from where he matriculated in March 1648/9. On 26th May 1649 Sebastian Pitfield was created a B.A. from Wadham College, Oxford - "by special favour of Sir Thomas Fairfax and Oliver Cromwell". This was obviously an honorary degree, bestowed upon him and seems to imply a reward for services to the Parliamentary cause. It was only a week before this that Cromwell and Fairfax had been in Oxford, where they were installed as Doctors of Civil Law, from All Saint's College. Mention of Sebastian is again made in the minute book of the Dorset Standing Committee in January 1649, when they receive a certificate from the Eighth Classical Presbytery of London, that Sebastian Pitfield is found qualified for the ministry and therefore ordained. Sebastian is appointed by the Committee to officiate in the Dorset parish of Bishops Caudle. The Commonwealth period was a time of upheaval in the Church, with many changes in clergy to reflect the Puritanical attitudes of Parliament. It would seem that Sebastian, after serving in the army and being favoured by Cromwell, saw the opportunity for a career in the Church. During this period the records of many parishes were neglected and none survive at Bishops Caundle during the time that Sebastian officiated there. In April 1654, according to a Certificate of Approbation, preserved in Lambeth Palace Library, Sebastian Pitfield was presented to the Dorset parish of Winfrith Newburgh, with the Chapelry of West Lulworth, under the patronage of "His Highness Oliver Lord Protector of the Commonwealth of England". Interestingly his brother Joseph was residing in the parish at this time. Once again parish records for this period were not kept but the State Papers Domestic show that he was minister there in 1657 and 1659. Sebastian managed to keep his position after the restoration of the monarchy in 1660 and is listed in the nearby tithing of West Chaldon for the Hearth Tax records of 1662/4. In 1671 Sebastian was appointed as the Rector of Warblington, near Chichester in Sussex. On 2nd September he married Mrs. Mary Foulks, a widow, at Southampton. This marriage came late in Sebastian's life, he by now being aged about fifty. He and Mary had one daughter named Grace and Sebastian remained as rector until his death in 1686. Some ten years after Sebastian's death there were reports of a ghost haunting the parsonage of Warblington. The ghost was seen by the curate, Rev. Thomas Wilkins. Reports of this reached a Mr. Caswell, a learned mathematician. He decided to investigate and interviewed witnesses and took detailed depositions. These were shown to two residents of Havant who both said the description of the ghost agreed very well with "Mr. P., a former rector of the place who has been dead above twenty years". It was soon taken that the ghost was Sebastian Pitfield and other stories circulated that he had fathered children by his maid, and then murdered them. All research into Sebastian's time at Warblington, however, seems to show that he was a respectable character, who discharged his duties as rector faithfully. It could well be that the ghost story was put about by smugglers, who used the rectory at various times. Pook Lane, Warblington was dubbed Spook Lane during smuggling days to discourage the inquisitive, as it was part of a vital smuggling route. Why stories of Sebastian's ill repute as a father to, and murderer of illegitimate children should gain currency is a mystery, although his colourful life during the Commonwealth period may explain it. Indeed it is also a mystery why Sebastian should have been thought to be the ghost, when the apparition seen in 1695 was said to resemble "Mr P., a former rector" who had been dead "above twenty years" when Sebastian Pitfield had died only nine years before in 1686.

3 Ellen Pitfield, Suffragette

Ellen Sarah Olivia Pitfield qualified as a midwife in April 1906, whilst living in Shepherd's Bush, London. On 18 November 1910 approximately 300 suffragettes campaigned outside the House of Commons when the Liberal government of Herbert Asquith failed to pass a Conciliation Bill which would allow some women the vote in General Elections for the first time.

Although the Bill got to its second reading, Herbert Asquith indicated that there would be no more Parliamentary time for the Bill. In response, the Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU) sent a delegation of around 300 women who were assaulted when they attempted to run past the police. Many suffragettes reported being assaulted and manhandled by the police and well over 100 were arrested.

Ellen Pitfield was amongst those injured on this day - referred to as Black Friday. Reports at the time state that the injuries led to her developing cancer, resulting in two operations and her case being declared incurable.

At the time of the 1911 census an Ellen Pitfield was a patient at a hospital in the Euston Road, St. Pancras - the only information given was her age of 49 - across the other columns the enumerator had written "Suffragette Refuses Information".

On March 3rd 1912 Ellen entered the General Post Office in London and set fire to a basket of shavings saturated with paraffin - then gave herself up to the police. She appeared at the Cental Criminal Court (some reports say she was carried from the prison hospital) and sentenced to six months imprisonment. This was the first incident of arson by a suffragette.

Ellen Pitfield was referred to in various reports as Nurse Pitfield. In April 1912 the British Journal of Nursing, whilst pointing out she was not a nurse but a qualified midwife and referring to her as Miss Pitfield, campaigned for her release from prison on the grounds that she only had a short time to live and the sentence was unduly harsh. The pressure led to her being released on April 16th after 45 days in the Infirmary at Holloway Prison.

A letter from the Matron of the Nursing Home that Ellen was transferred to appeared in The British Journal of Nursing on April 27th, describing the conditions and medical care she had received in prison. Ellen died in August 1912 - her death was registered in the name of Helen S. O. Pitfield.





There are a number of testimonials from various people with London addresses, most who state that they had employed Thomas Pitfield as a shoemaker - one saying Thomas Pitfield had worked for him for 11 years.

- 8 At the time of his conviction Thomas stated he had a wife and four children "presently in Buckle Street, Whitechapel"
- O Christenings of three children of Thomas and Grace Pitfield have been traced. Also two children, christened on the same day Jane Sparks Pitfield and Amy Spiers Pitfield daughters of Thomas and Jane Pitfield these are in the same register as the children of Thomas and Grace and were possibly registered with the incorrect mother's name. It seems that Jane Sparks Pitfield and Mary Ann Pitfield were sisters as a George Sills married them both see 15.

Another Mary-Ann Pitfield christened, a year after the marriage of Thomas and Grace, at Bath Abbey as the daughter of Thomas and Mary, could again be an incorrect entry



And I give unto my said Lady besides the jewels she hath had of me, fifty pounds to buy her mourning and my now coach and horses I also give to Mrs Mary Fortre her daughter ten pounds for Mourning, also I give and bequeath unto Elizabeth Cobb that attended me in my last sickness twenty pounds and unto Richard Matthews my clerk five pounds, unto John Chonossor(?) my servant five pounds, and to each of my servants that shall live with me at my decease forty shillings apiece over and above their wages then due, all which sums I do appoint to be paid within three months after my decease. 1 CHARLES PITFIELD OF HOXTON, MIDDLESEX 1599-1680

Parentage

Heralds Visitation of Middlesex in 1663 inquired into the ancestry of Charles Pitfield of Hoxton, Co. Middlesex. Using information supplied by Charles himself it states that Charles was:

the son of John Pitfield of Allington, co Dorset the 7th son of Robert Pitfold of Allington, and Anne Zouche, daughter of Charles Zouche, brother to Edward, Lord Zouche.

Some of this information seems to be inaccurate as John Pitfold was the 9th son of Robert Pitfold whilst Charles Zouche appears to have been the brother of George La Zouche, the 10th Baron of Harringworth, (-1569) rather than Edward La Zouche the 11th Baron (1556-1625). See further details on **Dorset 9**

2/3/1599 Christening of Charles, son of John Pitfold at Symondsbury, Dorset.

Little is known about the early life of Charles Pitfield but it would seem he had settled in London by the 1630's. He lived through the turbulent years of the English Civil War, the Commonwealth Period and the Restoration of the Monarchy. It is unclear if he gave any active support to either side in the Civil War but he appears to have prospered throughout both the Commonwealth and under the restored King Charles II.

1 ALEXANDER PITFIELD OF HOXTON 1658-1728

Alexander Pitfield was the only surviving son of Sir Charles Pitfield. He was educated at Merchant Taylors School, Charterhouse School, and Hoxton Private School. He was admitted a Fellow Commoner of Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge 25 April 1676, age seventeen, and was admitted to Lincoln's Inn 15 February 1676.

Alexander Pitfield was elected as a fellow of the Royal Society in 1684 and served on its council and as its treasurer from 1700 until his death. From the outset the Royal Society appointed Treasurers who were not men of science, as was the case with Alexander Pitfield. Amongst the archives of the Royal Society is a letter from Alexander asking Sir Christopher Wren to pay his membership fee which was overdue. Alexander translated Memoir's [sic] for a natural history of animals, containing the anatomical descriptions of several creatures dissected by the Royal Academy of Sciences at Paris by Claude Perrault, from the French. The book was published by the Royal Society in 1688.

As his father had been, Alexander was a conscientious magistrate, and appears to have been involved in the early stages of the movement for the 'reformation of manners', for he was a signatory in 1692 to proposals from the Middlesex commission of the peace for 'methods... for the encouragement of informers'

He was elected as the Member of Parliament for Bridport in 1698 and was returned several times, serving in the House of Commons until 1708, when he did not stand for re-election. In the 1701 Parliament he reported and carried to the Lords a private naturalization bill. His Whig sympathies were evident in 1710 when he signed the London lieutenancy's address condemning the Sacheverell riots. In his latter years he was taken up with schemes for poor relief in his father's parish of Shoreditch, in particular the building of a workhouse in Hoxton.

Alexander married firstly in 1680, to Elizabeth, daughter of Richard Waller, merchant of St Martin's, Ironmonger Lane, London and the couple had four children who survived infancy and went on to marry. Three of these four children, including his only son Charles Pitfield, predeceased Alexander, and only his daughter Winifred Ashley (nee Pitfield) survived him.

Alexander's first wife, Elizabeth, died in 1700 and Alexander remarried in 1702 to Dorothy, daughter of Thomas Boone of Mount Boone, near Dartmouth in Devon, widow of Robert Boddington, haberdasher of St Magnus parish in London.

Alexander Pitfield died on 19 Oct. 1728 and, after his body had lain 'in state' in Upholders' Hall, was buried at Shoreditch. His will, drawn up in the preceding July when he was 'somewhat indisposed in body', included bequests to the Hoxton workhouse, to a charity school and to 'the poor charity children' of the parish of St. Benet Fink, amounting in all to £350; with over £12,000 in other legacies, to his grandchildren, his 'book-keeper', 'clerk' and so on. His estate comprised of property in London and Essex, and various stocks in the Bank (where already in 1710 he had held enough to qualify for a vote in directorial elections), and in the East India and South Sea Companies.

Alexander was succeeded by his grandson Charles Pitfield (1712-1740), the son of Charles (1691-1715).

Alexander Pitfield's will of 1728

- ...my two grandaughters Elizabeth and Dorothy Ashley, daughters of my daughter Winifred Ashley... ...my grandchild Elizabeth Pitfield, daughter of my late son Charles Pitfield, deceased... ...my late father Sir Charles Pitfield... ...my grandson Charles Pitfield

2 CHARLES PITFIELD OF ST. JAMES, WESTMINSTER 1691-1715

Charles was the only son of Alexander Pitfield. Charles married Elizabeth Walden, daughter of Lionel Walden of Huntingdon, in 1712. The marriage appears to have been opposed by his father, as evidenced from a legal case after Charles' death.

1715 Pitfield v Pitfield. (C11 /2238/42) contested the Pitfield and Waller estates:

"About 1710 Charles Pitfield thought fit to marry Elizabeth Walden, not only without the approbation, but contrary to the advice and desire and in disobedience to the paternal authority of Alexander Pitfield"

It is not know why Alexander was opposed to the marriage, but it could be because the Walden family were sympathetic to the Jacobean cause.

Charles Pitfield made his will in February 1714 at the young age of 23. It seems he felt he might not survive his father Alexander as he made bequests to Alexander and requested Alexander to make certain investments on his behalf, to provide for his widow. Charles named his daughter Elizabeth and his son Charles in his will. A further daughter. Marianne, was born later in 1714.

Charles died in 1715 - reportedly from a fall from his horse (it is possible he had already had the fall when he made his will and finally succumbed to his injuries some 16 months later - conjecture!). He was buried at East Barnet as requested in his will.

In the case of 1715 Charles Pitfield (son and heir of Charles Pitfield, gent deceased) aged 31/2 years (by Alexander Pitfield, esq., his grandfather), Ann Pitfield and Winifred Pitfield, spinsters (daughters of said Charles Pitfield, deceased) and said Alexander Pitfield, took action against Elizabeth Pitfield, widow and others over the marriage settlement of Charles Pitfield and Elizabeth Walden

From 1716-1719 another case was pursued by Charles Pitfield, aged 5 years and his mother Elizabeth Pitfield, widow against Alexander Pitfield, Winifred Pitfield and others.

These cases were only two amongst an avalanche of litigation undertaken in the 1700s over the estate of Sir Charles Pitfield. Charles Pitfield (1691-1715) had already taken his father Alexander to court in 1713, over the provisions of the will of Sir Charles Pitfield.

Elizabeth Pitfield, the widow of Charles Pitfield (1691-1715) remarried, around,1718 to the Hon. Talbot Touchet, a member of a prominent Catholic family.

3 CHARLES PITFIELD 1712-1740

Charles Pitfield (1712-1740) was the only son of Charles Pitfield (1691-1715) and the grandson of Alexander Pitfield. As described in the previous sections, there was a great deal of litigation concerning his inheritance from his grandfather and great-grandfather as well as suits bought concerning his mother Elizabeth Walden.

Alexander Pitfield, having no male heir, after the death of his son Charles, was intent in ensuring his grandson Charles inherited from him. At one point Alexander's daughter, Winifred, tried to make the case that the terms of the will of Sir Charles Pitfield called for his estate to pass to a "male child of his son Alexander" and because at the time of Alexander's death he only had one surviving child the estate should go to that child - i.e. Winifred Ashlev/Pitfield.

In 1736 Charles Pitfield placed an advert in the Stamford Gazette offering a reward of six guineas for the return of a gold watch and chain, lost whilst hunting at South Ormsby, Lincolnshire. The watch and case were engraved with "two swans and a bending Grale" - the Pitfield coat of arms.

Charles had engaged a housekeeper, in 1735, to "look after his house and servants in Ormsby in Lincolnshire". In 1740 he took the housekeeper to court accusing her of defrauding him. There was a large estate in South Ormsby at this date but it was not owned by the Pitfield family. Charles could have been renting the estate or he might have had another house in the vicinity - I have been unable to find out.

The dispute between Ashley and Pitfield was, to some extent, resolved when, in 1737, Charles, aged 25 married his first cousin, Dorothy Ashley, aged 15. The marriage was short lived and produced two daughters, Winfred and Mary, with Charles dying in 1740.


Charles left a short will in which he left all his estate to his two daughters. He made his wife Dorothy Pitfield and his mother-in-law (and Aunt) Winifred Ashley the guardians of his daughters.

Charles's daughter Winifred died in 1741 and Mary Pitfield (1740-1807) became the sole heir to the Pitfield fortune.

Charles's widow Dorothy remarried in 1740 to the Honorable Felton Harvey.

Mary Pitfield (1740-1807) married in 1756 to Humphrey Sturt Esq, who was M.P. for Dorset from 1754-1784, by whom she had thirteen children.

The north part of the Hoxton estate was sold to pay the debts of Charles Pitfield the younger and was bought by his son-in-law Humphrey Sturt, while the remainder stayed in the ownership of Mary Sturt (nee Pitfield). Lord Allington, who was a descendant of Humphrey and Mary, was in possession of the estate when it was submitted for public action in 1917.



- 1 John Pitfold/Pitfeild was the only son of the marriage of John Pitfold the Younger (c1569-1629) and his third wife Priscilla Sydenham. John (1605-1661) married Agnes Payne at Exeter and the couple settled in the parish of Colaton Raleigh, Devon.
- There are no early parish records for the parish of Colaton Raleigh, so I have no records of the christenings of the children of John and Agnes, although other references show they had a t least the five children shown here. Similarly I have no record of the burials of John and Agnes, although it is known John died around 1661, as he left a will
- 3 John Pitfold came to the attention of the government of the Commonwealth in 1642 when the sequestration committee threatened to confiscate his property for supporting the royalist cause, but John declared his assets were less than £200 so he was exempt from sequestration. In 1651 the Committee for the Advance of Money investigated his activities during the war and found he had "...acted as a commissioner for the King and collector of Excise in the late war, and granted warrants in several parishes for payment of money on excise, on which several sums were paid him." I have been unable to find out if John was penalised by the committee.
- In 1659 there was a legal dispute (National Archives C 7/445/62) between Charles Pitfield of Allington, Dorset (1644-1710) and his brother Henry Pitfield of Whitchurch Canaonicorum, Dorset (1622-1660) and his wife Mary Pitfield (1686) see Dorset
 The answer to the Bill of Complaint was drawn up in the parish of Culliton (sic) in the county of Devon by a William Pitfield and a John Pitfield senior. the William Pitfield (-1712) and John Pitfold (-1661) shown here. The document also refers to an

- Abraham Pitfield, Gentleman. I have been unable to find out if this Abraham Pitfield really existed as I have no further references to him.
- 5 Because of the lack of records at Colaton Raleigh I have no burial records for John and Agnes though John must have died c1661 as he left a will, which has not survived.



- 6 1660 Poll Tax in parish of Ide George Pitfield and his wife listed. There are no Pitfield entries in the Ide parish records.
 - George Pitfield assessed for one hearth in tax records of 1671 in St. Sidwell and described as one of the poor of the parish. Only entries in the parish records are christenings of two children and burial of one of them. No marriage for George, or the burials of George and his wife, have been found.
- 7 Thomas Pitfield entered Merchant Taylor's School in 1638/9. The school register does not give his age but most pupils joined at around 9 years old.
 - In 1656, Thomas Pitfield, described as pleb, entered Hart Hall, Oxford and gained a BA there in 1659. It is likely that Thomas could not go directly to university when he left Merchant Taylors School around 1644, because of The English Civil War, and went to Oxford when the war was over.
- 8 Thomas Pitfield married Bridget Strong in 1664 and the couple had no children
- 9 A lease, taken out in 1668, on a property in Broadclyst made to Thomas Pitfeild of St. Sidwells in Exeter, maultmaker, for ninety nine years, if he or Bridget his wife or Thomas,

- 10 Thomas Pitfield was assessed for six hearths in tax records of 1671 in St. Sidwell and was the overseer of the poor, and paid Church Rates, there in 1666.
- 11 No burial for Thomas Pitfield has been found but he probably outlived Bridget as her burial record describes her as the wife of Thomas.
- 12 Exeter marriage licence 1662. Richard Balster of Colyton Raleigh and Joanna Pittfield of the same.
- 13 1668 William Pitfield and Thomas Pitfield paid Church Rates at Colaton Raleigh
- 14 1708 William Pitfield, gent paid Church Rates at East Budleigh.





- daughter Agnes, although I have no definite proof of his parentage.
- 2 John married Sarah Podbury in 1660 at Bicton and the couple christened their first two children at Bicton before settling in the parish of Venn Ottery, where he was a yeoman, and their subsequent children were christened.
- 3 John Pitfield of Venn Ottery left a will that was proved in 1706. This will has not survived. It was unusual, but not unknown, for a will to be proved ten vears after a person's death.
- 4 A court case of 1707 John Pitfeild v Thomas Dowdell (National Archives C 6/550/338) Bill of Complaint by John Pitfeild of Heavitree, yeoman refers to an indenture for a lease of 99 years on land and premises in Venn Otterv in 1662 for the lives of John Pitfield, the complainant's father, Sarah Pitfield the complainant's mother and one Agnes Potbury. John stated his father had died some nine years previously and his mother, Sarah, still lived.
 - Another case in November 1708 John Pitfeild v John Dowdell (National Archives C 6/550/341) John the complainant is referred to as "of Venn Ottery. yeoman" and refers to the same lease as the case of 1707 and states his father John Pitfeild had died nine years since and his mother Sarah Pitfeild had died a quarter of a year previously.
- 5 A further case in 1707 Richard Jerman v John Pitfield, Richard Jerman of Bradnich was the father of Joan Jerman, the wife of John Pitfield. The case refers to John Pitfield and his widow Sarah and their children John, Mary, Agnes and Sarah. In the answer given by John Pitfield (possibly given the following year 1708) he states that his mother has died since the Bill of Complaint was written.

- 6 In a case of 1709 (National Archives C8/629/4) Richard Jerman stated that his daughter "Johan intermarried the Complainant John Pittfeild without the consent approbation and good liking of the said Defendant Richard Jerman"
- 7 John Pitfield junior was married firstly to Ann Dilling and the couple had two children christened in the parish of Clyst Honiton. After the death of his wife in 1695 and his father in 1696 John settled in Venn Otterv where he married Joan Jerman/German in 1697.


- When Joan Pitfield neé Jerman died in 1719 she was buried in her home parish of Bradninch.
- Thomas, the son of John and Joan was apprenticed to Richard Pratt of Bradninch, cordwainer in 1719.

- 10 London Gazette Issue 5880, published on the 23 August 1720. John Pitfield, late of Ven Ottery, Yeoman. - Insolvent Debtor
- 11 A John Pitfield left a will proved in 1733, in which he is described as John Pitfield of Powderham. The will has not survived. There are no Pitfield entries in the Powderham registers and no burial of a John Pitfield c.1733 has been found in any register. It would appear that John of Powderham was married to Hannah, as Hannah Pitfield "widow of Powderham" married in 1735.

It is possible that John of Powderham is the same John who was married to Ann Dilling and Joan Jerman, having moved from Venn Ottery after becoming insolvent and that Hannah was his third wife. However there is no proof of this and no marriage of a John Pitfield to a Hannah has been traced.







- William Pitfield (-1712) was referred to as William Pitfield of Colaton Raleigh in a number of documents. Amongst these is an entry in Alumui Oxonienses (see Note 6)
- 2 1668 William Pitfield paid Church Rates at Colaton Raleigh
- 3 1708 William Pitfield, gent paid Church Rates at East Budleigh.
- There are no early records for the parish of Colaton Raleigh but William's children were christened in the neighbouring parish of East Budleigh. Little else is known concerning William, but it would seem he must have been a person of some standing to send a son to Oxford.
- 5 In 1659 there was a legal dispute (National Archives C 7/445/62) between Charles Pitfield of Allington, Dorset (1644-1710) and his brother Henry Pitfield of Whitchurch Canaonicorum, Dorset (1622-1660) and his wife Mary Pitfield (1686) see Dorset 8.1. The answer to the Bill of Complaint was drawn up in the parish of Culliton (sic) in the county of Devon by a William Pitfield and a John Pitfield senior. William and Agnes had ten children christened, eight of whom were girls.

No relationship of John Pitfield to either of the two William Pitfields is given or inferred but he was almost certainly the uncle, on his mother's side, of the William Pitfield the nephew (1689-1709) See Dorset 9.3.1 No burial of a William Pitfield in 1709 has been found.



- 4 Dorothy Laud was one of the daughters of John Laud, gent of Plymtree, Devon and his wife Thomasin Laud.
- Whilst John and Dorothy were living in the parish of Colyton, Devon another John Pitfield (1695-1746), settled in the parish around 1750 (see Dorset 2.1.1)



- 13 Thomas Pitfold left a will made in Barbados 1659 and proved in 1660, in which he is referred to as Captain Thomas Pitfold, Gent names wife Margaret and son Sebastian (younger than 18 years).
- Sebastian Pitfold/Pitfield left a will made and proved in Barbados in 1681 in which he is referred to as Sebastian Pittfield - names his wife Sarah and his mother Mrs Elliott (possible his mother remarried or could be referring to his mother-in-law). Refers to "plantation which was my father's Capt. Thomas Pitfield.

It would seem that Thomas Pittfold was an early settler in Brabados which was occupied by the British from 1627. No references to the family name have been found in any parish records in Barbados. The name does not appear in a database of plantations/plantation owners. By 1660 sugar plantations had become established and were worked using black slave labour.

1 The family of Sebastian Pitfold and Mary Mountier - to be read in conjunction with Table Dorset 10

SEBASTIAN PITFOLD of Allington and Bridport (1570-1613)

Sebastian was the youngest son of Robert Pitfold of Allington (1516-1586) - see Dorset 0. He is the only child of Robert's whose baptism has been traced. From the will of Robert Pitfolde (1516-1586) it can be seen that Sebastian had served an apprenticeship. Where or when the apprenticeship took place, and in what trade, is not known, but Sebastian must have undertaken it at an early age as Robert Pitfold made his will only 13 years after Sebatian's christening. Robert's will also left property and land to Sebastian.

Item I give and bequeath unto Bastian Piotfolde my sonne all righte title interest and terme of years that I have yet to come in ffee farme of the moitye or halfandeale of four tenements and two cottages with theire appurtenants in Poorestock aforesaid in the said county of Dorset now or late in the several tenures of John Gill, Joane Gill widow and Alice ffrench(?) widowe whiche I bought of the said Nicholas Hare Esquire to have and to hold the moitye or halfendeale of the said four tenements and two cottages with theire appurtenants unto the said Bastain Pitfolde and to his assignes during all the siade years yet to comein ffee farme as aforesaid

Item I give and bequeath unto Bastain Pitfolde my sonne all my Righte title interest and terme of years That I have yet to come of and in all those burgages with their appurtenures nowe or of late in the several tenures of John Charde, Walter fforde, John Style, Robert Tiptree, Joan Denewill(?) widowe. Christopher Bottoscombe, ????? Collens, Richard Collens, John Peryame, John Follett, Robert Pavey and Nicholas Eggerton whiche I bought of the said Christopher Symes To have and to holde the same Burgages with theire appurtementes unto the saide Bastain Pitfolde and his assignes during all the saide yeares yet to come as aforesaid Item I give and bequeathe unto Bastain Pitfolde my sonne forty shillings of Lawfull money of England whiche his master hathe with him as a????? During his apprentishood

Sebastian also came into a piece of land called Curtops, consisting of 1 messuage, 31 acres, in Allington, which had been left to Andrew Pitfold (-1586), the fourth son of Robert (see Dorset 4). When Andrew died without male issue Curtops passed to Thomas Pitfold (1602) the fifth son of Robert (see Dorset 5) before Thomas left it to Sebastian in his will. Thomas also owned a further 2 messuages and 32 acres of land in Allington which he also left to his brother Sebastian.

In a document dated 1595 Sebastian and Henry Pitfold (see Dorset 8) are named as the executors of the will of Johan Pitfolde their like deceased mother, wife and executrix of Robert Pytfold their like deceased father. The will of Joan/Johan Pitfolde has not survived.

Sebastian married Mary Mountier, one of two daughters and co-heirs of Lawrence Mountier, who owned land in Ludwell within the parishes of Donhead St. Mary, Wiltshire. Lawrence Mountier died circa 1589 - his father John Mountier had left a will in 1586 in which he named "...my son Lawrence's daughter Marie....." Sebastian and Mary were married by 1606, as noted in an indenture: "...Sebastian Pytfold and Mary his wife one of the daughters and co-heirs of Lawrence Mountier deceased on the one part....." This was for the sale of some lands in the parishes of Donhead St. Mary and Donhead St. Lawrence, in the county of Wiltshire. There are a number of further indentures for the sale of property in Donhead St. Mary by Sebastian and Mary up until

1609. See the table, further on in this volume, showing the Pitfold/Pitfield connections with families in the parish of Donhead St. Mary.

During much of Sebastian's adult life England was engaged in the Anglo-Spanish War (1585–1604) - an intermittent conflict between the kingdoms of Spain and England that was never formally declared - during which the Spanish Armada was repelled in 1588. There were opportunities for adventurers to make a fortune with an explosion in trade and exploration and through attacking Spanish shipping.

In a letter dated 1605 Thomas Sackville, first Earl of Dorset, who was the Lord Treasurer of England in the reign of King James I wrote to a Mr Garaway. who was a Treasury civil servant. The letter confirms that King James 'under the signet' has 'given and bestowed' upon two sea captains 'amongst others' 'the sum of £100 for service at sea during the last year of his predecessor's reign.' On behalf of the late Queen Elizabeth he is rewarding Captain Giles Thornton of the 'Pearse' from Plymouth and Captain Sebastian Pitfolde of the 'Recompence' from Weymouth. The letter says that on a voyage they had discovered a Spanish Carrack in the 'rodes' (anchorage) of Secembra (Sesimbra) and 'did give spedye intelligence thereof to her late Majestie shipps being then at sea'. The Carrack was seized and Thornton and Pitfolde 'were afterwards themselves employed in bringing her into Plymouth Sound and the River Tamar'. Consequently, having used the victuals and other provisions and consumed their time, they had to 'overthrewe their intended vioge (voyage) to their great losse'. Garaway was instructed to 'paye unto his Majestie this sum and ensure that Giles Thornton received £50 and Sebastian Pitfolde £10'.

The letter refers to a naval engagement that took place on 3rd June 1602 in Sesimbra Bay, on the coast of Portugal, some 40 miles south of Lisbon. Portugal at the time was part of the Iberian Union, effectively part of Spain. Queen Elizabeth I had decided to despatch a fleet of nine English and twelve Dutch ships, which were 'to infest the Spanish coast' and to prevent Spanish incursions against Ireland and England. Five English ships set sail on the 9th March 1602 and the rest of the fleet followed later and the ships rendezvoused towards the end of May. Much of the squadron had to return home because of illness, unseaworthiness or because they had been separated. On June 1 the fleet, consisting of only five ships and two captured Spanish prizes, was off the coast of Lisbon. Vice Admiral Sir William Monson, who commanded one the ships gave an account of the voyage, some years later, in his "Naval Tracts". The tracts were first published in 1704.

....Upon Tuesday 1st June....descried a Carvel from Cape Espichel bearing with them; which, by Signs she made, they perceived had a desire to speak to them....The Carvel being fetched up gave Account, That a Carrack and 11 Gallies were in Cerimba (sic) Road....

This account seems to mirror the account given in the letter of 1605, so the caravel could have been the 'Pearse' captained by Giles Thornton or the 'Recompence' captained by Sebastain Pitfold. A caravel was a small highly-manoeuvrable sailing ship developed in the 15th century by the Portuguese to explore along the West African coast and into the Atlantic Ocean.

On the morning of June 3rd the English ships entered Sesimbra Bay where

they found the Spanish ships strongly posted under the guns of Fort Santiago de Sesimbra. There is not room here to give a full account of the battle - see https://worddisk.com/wiki/Battle of Sesimbra Bay/

At the end of the battle the Spanish had suffered 800 killed or wounded, the fort had been immobilized, two galleys had sunk, and the carrack had been captured. A parlay was offered by the English, which the Spanish accepted. The carrack was a huge 1,700-ton vessel, *São Valentinho*, recently returned from the Portuguese Indies laden with goods. Under the terms of the parlay the English were allowed to take the carrack, with its cargo, as a prize and it was sailed back to Plymouth. According to the letter of 1605 Captains Thornton and Pitfolde helped in its escort back to home port. The cargo aboard the *São Valentinho* was worth around £44,000 - a huge sum at the time. It could be that Pitfolde and Thornton agreed to help escort the carrack back to Plymouth in the hope of claiming a portion of the prize. The sum of £10 awarded to Sebastian Pytfolde, some three years after the event, seems somewhat paltry in comparison to the value of the prize!!

Hints within the letter of 1605 point to Sebastian being just one of a group of "adventurers" aboard the Recompence who had invested in the venture. One of these was named as John Randoll, who from other sources appears to have been someone of some standing in Weymouth.

Thus, it would seem that Sebastian was the captain of a vessel, based in Weymouth, from at least 1602. It seems likely that the "Recompence" was bound for the Caribbean travelling along the coast of Portugal, then to the Azores and hence across the Atlantic. It is not known if Sebastian and his partners recommenced their voyage after returning to Plymouth.

In 1609 Sebastian and Mary's son Robert Pitfold was born - see below for more details.

In 1611 an indenture was drawn up ".....Between Maximilian Mohun of Fleet in the County of Dorset Esquire and Sebastian Pitfold of Portland in the County aforesaid gent on the one parte And Robert Nociter of Bridport in the County aforesaid Miller on the other parte....." and also refers to "....the said Sebastian Pitfield and Mary his wife...."

The Indenture relates to a piece of land in Bridport, Dorset.

The register of christenings at Portland - which is close to Weymouth - does not survive before 1631, so no records of the name Pitfold have been traced in the parish. Similarly no early Pitfold reference have been found in the registers of Weymouth or Melcombe Regis.

Sebastian Pitfolde died in 1613 and was buried at Bridport where he was described as "of Allington"

Sebastian did not leave a will but an Inquisition Post Mortem (InqPM) was taken at Sherborne, Dorset on the 14th April 1615 to inquire into his land holdings. The InqPM described Sebastian Pitfold as Gent and found he owned:

2 messuages and 31 acres in Allington

One cottage or tenement called Perriams containing 9 acres in Allington, held by deed dated 1606.

The above properties were leased out by Sebastian and his wife Mary for the use of the said Mary and her legitimate heirs by Sebastian.

The InqPM also found that Anne Pitfold, the widow of Thomas Pitfold deceased, brother of the said Sebastian, had a lifehold interest in 1 messuage and 22 acres in Allington called Curtops with the revision on the same to the said Sebastian. (i.e. it would revert to Sebastian, or his heir, upon the death of Anne).

The InqPM noted that Robert Pittfod was Sebastian's son and heir and the heir of the body of Mary the wife of Sebastian and was aged 5 years 2 months and 28 days at the time of the Inquisition being taken (i.e born January 1609/10).

The InqPM does not refer to any property in the parish of Portland, although it notes that Sebastian's widow, Mary Pitfold, was living at Portland at that time. It also noted that Anne, the widow of Thomas, was still alive and living in Colyton in Devon.

It would seem that Sebastian was a man of some wealth, owning considerable property in Allington and coming into lands in Donhead St. Mary upon his marriage to Mary Mountier The couple chose to sell the Donhead lands after settling in Portland, Dorset - at or before 1602, where Sebastian was the captain of the ship Recompense of Weymouth. The Elizabethan age was a time of exploration, trading and piracy. Unfortunately, apart from the one reference in 1605 which relates to 1602, we have no details of Sebastian's career as a sea captain.

What became of Sebastian's widow, and any children, is unknown - the last reference to Mary is in the InqPM which says she was living at Portland in 1615. She may have died there and it is possible she remarried.

The InqPM refers to Robert Pitfold, (more details below) as the heir of Sebastian and Mary Pitfold, although it is possible that the couple had other children. I think it highly likely that Sebastian and Mary were the parents of:

Thomas Pitfold/Pitfield of Barbados (-1660)

Little is known concerning Thomas Pitfold (-1660). From his will (note 13) and the will of his son Sebastian Pitfield of Barbados (-1681) (note 14) it can be seen he is referred to as a Captain and a Gent - the same as Sebastian Pitfold (1570-1613). It seems that Thomas (-1660) followed in his father's footsteps and was a ship's captain and purchased a plantation on the island of Barbados. Barbados had been discovered in 1492 by the Spanish. In 1625 an English ship landed at the then deserted island, and the first English settlers arrived there in 1627. So it can be seen that Thomas Pitfold/Pitfield was an early English inhabitant of the Island, although there is a frustrating lack of references to him there and it is not known when he arrived.

Robert Pitfold/Pitfield of Donhead St. Mary, Wiltshire & Shaftesbury, Dorset (1609-1680)

As stated above it is not known what became of Mary Pitfold and her children after the death of Sebastian. However, their eldest son Robert Pitfold (1609-1680) married in 1627 to Mary Knapton. Mary Knapton was the daughter of Renaldo Knapton of the parish of Donhead St. Mary, Wiltshire. The Knaptons were an established and wealthy family in the parish. Mary Pitfold nee Mountier, the widow of Sebastian Pitfold (1570-1613) had been born in the parish of Donhead St. Mary, so it seems likely that she returned there, with her children, at some point. See the table, later in this volume, that gives some details of the Mountier and Knapton families of the parish of Donhead St. Mary and their connections with the Pitfold/Pitfield family. The chart also shows some of the Meggs family of Donhead St. Mary - one of whom married a Mary Pitfold - see below.

References to Robert Pitfold/Pitfield are scarce, and the parish records for

Donhead St. Mary are patchy, but one son of Robert and Mary was christened at Donhead St. Mary - Sebastian Pitfold/Pitfield (1632-1702) and Robert himself was buried in the parish in 1680. For more details of Sebastian Pitfold/Pitfield (1632-1702) refer back to Table Dorset 10 and to the article overleaf: The Parish of Fordington and the Pitfields.

In 1653 a survey was made of a messuage and lands called "Magdalen's Chantry" within the parish of Allington, Dorset. In establishing the whereabouts of the chantry the survey listed various lands that bordered it including "the lands of Robert Pittfold of Sharston". Sharston was the old name for the town of Shaftesbury in Dorset. Shaftesbury is the nearest large town to the Wiltshire parish of Donhead St. Mary so it would seem that the survey was referring to land owned by Robert Pitfold (1609-1680), which he had inherited from his father Sebastian Pitfold (1570-1613). The parish records for Shaftesbury are sparse but Mary Pitfold, daughter of Robert Pitfold (1609-1680) and Mary Knapton (-1695) married in the parish, in 1654, to Ferdinando Meggs. Banns for the marriage were published at Shaftesbury which described "Mary Pitfold of Sharston St. Peter the daughter of Robert Pitfield of Carleton in the parish of Donhead." Meggs was another family from Donhead St. Mary.

Although the christening of only one chid of Robert Pitfold and Mary Knapton has been traced, other records and references have been used to establish a further four children - for details of these children refer back to table Dorset 10.

THE PARISH OF FORDINGTON AND THE PITFIELDS by Hugh Pitfield of Hampshire and Michael Pitfield of Buckinghamshire, 2016

The founding father of the Fordington Pitfields was Sebastian Pitfield (1632-1702), the son of Robert of Donhead St. Mary, Wiltshire. Sebastian married Christian Meadon (1641-1715) and they lived in the two parishes of Chaldon Herring and Broadmayne, before moving to Fordington sometime between 1685 and 1695. Sebastian may well have decided to settle in the parish because his uncle, Renaldo Knapton, was already living and prospering there. Sebastian only had two children who outlived him and only his son Charles Pitfield (1666-1743) married and had children. The Knaptons continued to be prominent in Dorchester, Renaldo's son Thomas and his grandson, another Thomas Knapton, were Governors of the town gaol and had homes in Fordington.

Sebastian Pitfield's will shows him to have been a man of some wealth. His son Charles was Churchwarden of Fordington three times - 1726, 1730 and 1731. His accounts survive.

Early generations of the Pitfield family in Fordington prospered and were described as 'yeoman' They invariably had large families, as was common at the time, and thus the Pitfield family in Fordington grew very substantially over the 18th and 19th centuries.

Joseph Pitfield of West Knighton was wealthy, described as being a 'yeoman farmer' holding land in Bere Regis. In his will he left a large estate divided between his wife and the children of his brother Sebastian of Fordington.

By the mid/late 1700s, much of the family were less prosperous and many of the menfolk found work only as agricultural labourers and some continued as such well into the 19th century. Others had developed skills or professions such as masonry, tailoring and hairdressing.

In 1835 Fordington was incorporated into the enlarged Borough of Dorchester and it had the dubious distinction of being the poorest and most overcrowded of the four Dorchester parishes, containing nearly half the Borough population, with 2,986 souls listed in the 1851 census, 35 of whom were Pitfields (with another 6 Pitfields listed elsewhere in Dorchester). A Board of Health report of 1848 described conditions there:

" in High Fordington, for want of means of cleansing, typhus fever has not been absent for the last three years, and in Lower Fordington there is a crowded and pauper population dwelling in the midst of filth."

A more graphic account was given by the Reverend Henry Moule, vicar of Fordington, in a letter published by the Dorset County Chronicle, at the time of the cholera epidemic of 1854:

At the East end of Dorchester, then, and within a space that can scarcely exceed five acres, about 1,100 persons are congregated in a set of dwellings, many of which are of the most wretched description, and utterly destitute of the ordinary conveniences of life. This space consists of two great divisions, Mill Street, on the one side of a Mill Pond, and Holloway Row, together with Cuckold Row and Standfast, on the other side. - In Mill Street, the floors of the houses lie considerably below the highest elevation of the pond, and some of them even below its bed. The other division consists of two, and in one part of it, of three rows of cottages, rising one

above the other, from the bank of the Mill Pond, on the other side. of a chalk hill. In Holloway Row, about twenty of the cottages have a small patch of ground, about 18 feet square, and a pathway and lane in front of them. They have also a little space hollowed out of the hill behind them. But, with these exceptions, scarcely a cottage in this division (and the same may be said of many in Mill Street) has a single inch of ground beyond that on which it stands. Their filth is consequently cast either into the open and wretched drain in the street, or into the Mill Pond, from which, moreover, the people draw most of their water for washing, and sometimes, even for culinary purposes, "the conveniences" of more than half these 1,100 people empty themselves together with the filth from the County Goal. and of some portion of the other three Parishes of Dorchester. The population, with few exceptions, consists of mechanics, labourers. and paupers from this and many other parishes. Vice, in its worst forms, abounds amonast them.

This chronic overcrowding was caused by the building of tenements in the early 1800's, as an outlet for the poorer inhabitants of the increasing population of Dorchester, on the only piece of freehold land available in the area. The land was owned by the Duchy of Cornwall, which since the death of Prince Albert had become poorly managed. In these circumstances several Pitfield families lived in Mill Street, Holloway Row, Cuckolds Row and elsewhere in Fordington, throughout the nineteenth century. Their fortunes had changed from the time of their yeoman ancestors and those who still had farming connections were employed as agricultural labourers. Others worked in the iron foundry or were general labourers or mason's labourers, whilst their womenfolk were engaged in domestic service or took in laundry to supplement the family income. Illegitimacy rates were high in such areas, including amongst the Pitfields

The conditions in Fordington were ripe for the spread of cholera, which was introduced by the intake of unwelcome strangers to Dorchester in 1854. After the departure of the garrison to the Crimean war, the Dorchester Barracks were left empty, and it was proposed that they should be used to house convicts from the overcrowded Millbank penitentiary in London. Despite the concern and protests of the Mayor and Aldermen of Dorchester regarding the risk of the spread of cholera, which was rife in the London prison, 700 prisoners were transferred to Dorchester on August 15th. On August 24th Rev. Moule found that two women in Holloway Row had been employed to wash for the convicts. Moule pleaded in vain with the Mayor to have the laundry removed, and within a few days a child living 60 yards from one of the women's cottages was taken ill and died. In the weeks that followed there were at least 30 more deaths from cholera, with many more taken ill. Although no members of the Pitfield family were amongst those who died it is probable that they were affected to some extent by the outbreak.

A local Board of Health had been set up in Dorchester in 1853, and after the cholera epidemic it implemented street cleaning and drew up plans for deep sewerage and a new water supply. Due to the efforts of the Board, and the campaigning of the Rev. and Mrs. Moule, conditions in Fordington gradually improved during the second half of the nineteenth century.

George Pitfield (1815-1874) prospered as publican of the Union Arms in Cuckold's Row, Fordington. His son George (1844-1917) became publican of the Bull's Head

and was succeeded by his son George John (1871-1947). The elder George was a keen pigeon breeder and won many prizes and cups at national events such as the Crystal Palace Show in 1896. George John was unsuccessful - family lore says he drank the profits. He moved his family to Uxbridge in Middlesex in 1906 and set up a small business as a barber. He had been an apprentice to his uncle Edwin earlier in his life. The Bulls Head still exists, as does the building that was the Union Arms

Edwin Pitfield (1855-1922) was a successful master hairdresser with premises in High West Street (they still exist). He was barber to Thomas Hardy and described seeing the first Mrs Hardy freewheeling her bicycle down the street with her skirts flapping behind her. Edwin's daughter Hetty was murdered by her husband after she discover him having an affair, He, Lewis Owen, then committed suicide.

Another anecdote relates to the huge stone on the corner of Fordington Square opposite the church. This stone is still there but in former times it was highly polished. This was because all the lads of the area, including very many Pitfield boys used to gather there in summer evenings and sit of the stone. This had the effect of smoothing and polishing it. It became known as 'The Pitfield Stone'.

The coming of the railways brought further opportunities for work including for several Pitfields. Resulting mobility meant that families could look further afield for homes and work, thus the Fordington Pitfields began to spread out to other parts of the country with many being drawn to London and the South East.

Others made their future even further afield and emigrated to the New World and the antipodes. Many of those who left have been traced and have been connected to the family tree. Other members of the family had criminal tendencies and Mary Pitfield was transported to Australia in 1842.


In common with most families, the Pitfields lost sons in the First World War. One such was very unusual - an early airman, Henry, Air Mechanic 1st Class, in the Royal Navy Air Services on HMS President. He died in 1918 at the age of 19, son of Henry and Kate Pitfield who were by this time living in Wimborne. He features in the War Memorial Book at Wimborne Minster.


The Fordington parish records contain more Pitfield entries than in any of the other Dorset parishes, due to several couples having ten or more children. Sebastian Pitfield (1757-1815) had ten children and 28 Pitfield grandchildren christened at Fordington, although a fairly high child mortality rate meant that a number did not survive. In 1871 there were 43 Pitfields listed in the census for Fordington. During the next ten years there was a marked reduction in this number, with many female Pitfields marrying and other members of the family moving out of the parish. The last christening of a Pitfield at Fordington was in 1916, although some members of the family were buried there as late as the 1940's and there are still Pitfields living in nearby Dorchester today.



RICHARD KNAPTON 1 Richard Knapton left a will in 1597 in which he described himself as a Gentleman of Donhead St Mary in Wiltshire. He had become the Lord of the Gentleman of Donhead St. Mary, Wiltshire Manor of Brockenhurst, Co. Southampton by 1582. Lord of the Manor of Brockenhurst, Hampshire The Manor of Brockenhurst was left to Richard's son Alban, whilst Richard's -1597 other son Renaldo Knapton continued in Donhead St. Mary as a yeoman. C. В. M. MARGARET 3 Renaldo Knapton made a will in 1639 amongst other bequests and people mentioned C. "my son in law Pytfold"" В. It is possible they married pre 1837 but I have not been able to find a marriage record.





Fatal accident in the docks-An inquest was held at the Saddler's Arms. Marsh-lane. vesterday after-noon, before Mr. E. C. Coxwell the borough coroner, on view of the body of James Pitfield - Dr. Palk deposed that about ten o'clock on Saturday night he was called to see the deceased, at No. 12. Threefield-lane. He found him in a state of great exhaustion, but quite sensible. He was evidently suffering from a great shock, and told witness he got between the buffers of two railway wagons, and before he could get out of the way was jammed. He complained of pain in the lower part of the back. Witness examined him carefully, but could not defect the injuries he had received, but imagined death was occasioned by the rupture of some internal organ, probably the bladder. The only external injury appeared to be an abrasion of the skin at the upper part of the hip. Witness prescribed suitable medicine, and upon visiting him about seven o'clock on the following morning he found him guite insensible and dying, and he died while witness was present. The injuries received in the way deceased had described were without doubt the cause of death. Deceased imputed blame to no one.-Charles Freeborn, a carter in the employ of the Dock Company, said that the deceased was a driver in the same employ. On Saturday evening, just after nine o'clock, witness was coupling some railway wagons in the docks, and deceased was bringing them towards him with his horses. When taking away the hook attached to the traces of one of the wagons he could not get it off, and tried to escape, but in so doing was caught by the buffers. Witness was between the same wagons, and so long as he remained so there was no danger, and he could not account for deceased attempting to get out as he did. When the wagons parted deceased fell down, and witness took the hook off and lifted him up. In reply to his Question as to whether he was hurt, he said, "I shall be better directly" Assistance was procured from the dock gates, and he was carried as far as the gate, where he was placed in a fly, and then driven home, one of the dock policemen accompanying him-A verdict of "Accidental death" was immediately returned.





At the time of the 1901 census Alfred was living back with his parents where his age was given as 16 and he was employed on the railways.

In February 1904 Alfred enlisted in the Royal Engineers at Fordington. He gave his aged as 19 years and 5 months and gave his occupation as Engine Driver. He signed for a Short Service, involving 3 years with the colours and a further 9 years as a reserve. For 2 of his three years service Alfred was stationed in Mauritius. As a reservist Alfred was mobilized at Bulford Camp. Salisbury Plain, at the outbreak of war on 4th August 1914. His service record lists his illegitimate son - Alfred George Pitfield Lake - which implies that he acknowledged him and presumably contributed to his

Alfred appears to have been sent to France almost immediately and was wounded on 26th August 1914. He spent a lot of the war in England and had several spells in hospital with various ailments (including venereal disease in 1916). He was charged on several occasions of being absent without leave or not returning at the end of leave.

In 1917 Alfred married Florence Ellen Lake. Alfred George Pitfield Lake became Alfred George Pitfield Alfred returned to France in October 1917, returning home for 14 days leave on 30th August 1918. His leave was extended to 17th September but he did not return from leave until 8th October. He was arrested and served 28 days and forfeited 21 days pay. He did not return to France.



2 John William Pitfield (1892-1917) was killed whilst serving as a Fifth Engineer Officer aboard the hospital ship "AUSTURIAS" which was torpedoed by the Germans in the English Channel – March 20th 1917. He was buried in Dorchester Cemetery in a grave maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

The ASTURIAS was built in 1907 for the Royal Mail Steam Packet Co. and went into service on the Southampton - Buenos Aires run. When war with Germany was declared in 1914 she was requisitioned by the Admiralty and converted into a Hospital Ship. Within a few months she was handed over to the Army and was soon employed making regular crossings to France carrying back the wounded from the Western Front. She had accommodation for 896 patients, but on one occasion due to very heavy casualties at the Front, she transported 2,400 sick and wounded. She served in the Eastern Mediterranean during the Dardanelles Campaign, returning wounded from Gallipoli, Egypt and Salonika to the UK. In March 1917 after landing her wounded at Avonmouth, she was attacked by a German submarine and struck by a torpedo which blew off her stern. killing 35 of her crew.

3 Henry Pitfield (1899-1918) was an Air Mechanic 1st Class in the Royal Naval Air Service. He joined on the 4th January 1918 and served at HMS President, which was a shore based training facility. He died on the 1st March 1918 from natural causes.

He is buried at Wimborne, Dorset in a grave maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

Notes for George 1 - the family of George Pitfield of Canada (1749-1827)

The earliest reference to George Pitfield in North America is in New York City where he is listed as a member of the Freemason

Where George had been previously to this date is unknown, although it is known he was born around 1749. His parentage is the subject to two differing theories.

George Pitfield's origins - theory one

The first theory concerning the origins of George Pitfield is that he originally had the name PETTFIELD and was the son of George Pettfield and Isabel Jefferson, who married in Hessle, Yorkshire in 1731,

The theory is based in part in the belief that George Pitfield of New Brunswick had the second name of Jefferson. This is based on a newspaper report in the Sussex Kings County Record in 1894 which refers to George Jefferson Pitfield, the grandfather of William T and Ward C Pitfield. This article was written 67 years after the death of George Pitfield. However there are no references to George having a middle name during his lifetime. George's son William Henry Pitfield (1806-1872) did christen a son as George Jefferson Pitfield in 1843 (see George 1.3)

It is possible that William Henry Pitfield named his son after his father, but as there is no proof the "original" George Pitfield (c1749-1827) used the middle name Jefferson it is equally possible that William Henry chose Jefferson after a local family that he, or his wife, was connected to. William Henry Pitfield (1806-1872) used surnames, that had connections to his wife's family, as middle names for a number of his children - (see George 3.1). Although Jefferson was a fairly common family name in New Brunswick at this time I have been unable to establish a connection between a local Jefferson and Henry William Pitfield or his wife Anna Barbara Cougle, so it is possible the connection could be back to George (c1749-1827).

Another son of George Pitfield (c1749-1827), Oliver Arnold Pitfield (1809-1880), christened a son as George J. Pitfield c1845 (see George 1.4). It is not known what the initial J stood for but if it was Jefferson it would add great weight to this first

This first theory is boosted by the fact that Gorge Pitfield (1749-1827) christened a daughter Isabel, possibly after his mother.

No christenings of any children of George Pettfield and Isabel Jefferson have been traced.

George Pitfield's origins - theory two

Family tradition in North America has it that George Pitfield (c1749-1827) was the brother of Benjamin Pitfield (1741-1793) of New Jersey and therefore the son of John Pitfield and Hannah Hallett of Colyton, Devon - see Dorset 2.1.1.1

George Pitfield's age at the time of his death in 1827 was given as 78, giving a date of birth of circa 1749. Hannah Pitfield had been a widow since 1746 so it seems unlikely that she was the mother of George, although she could have been if George's date at death was incorrect and he was born a few years earlier. In 1885 George William Brown, of Philadelphia, America, wrote a book entitled "Historical Genealogy relating to a Branch of the Brown Family". In the volume Brown states that his wife's grandfather, Benjamin Pitfield (1741-1793) came to America from England, but that nothing was known of Benjamin's origins in England. My research has now established Benjamin's origins. Brown says in his book that Benjamin came to America at the invitation of an uncle who was in possession of a tract of land lying upon Timber Creek, in the state of New Jersey. I think this part of Brown's narrative has been distorted and that in fact it was George Pitfield who was invited to America by his uncle Benjamin Pitfield - who was indeed settled at Timber Creek, New Jersey. If George Pitfield (c1749-1827) was the nephew of Benjamin then he must have been the son of John Pitfield of Child Okeford (1727-1771). A birth of George Pitfield around 1749 would fit with the marriage of John Pitfield to Mary Crago in 1747. There would have been only eight years difference in the ages of the uncle and nephew.

The above three paragraphs are copied from Notes 20-22 from Dorset 2.1.1.1 - see that table for more details.

No christenings of any children of John Pitfield and Mary Crago have been traced.

GEORGE PITFIELD Esq of Fulham

In 1770 a newspaper entitled:

The TOWN and COUNTRY Magazine or UNIVERSAL Repository of KNOWLEDGE. INSTRUCTION and ENTERTAINMENT includes an entry that reads:

BIRTHS April 11 The lady of George Pitfield esg: of Fulham, of three children, two sons and a daughter

I have been unable to find any other references to this George Pitfield, in or around the parish of Fulham. He appears to have been somebody of some standing and wealth to be described as "esquire". The survival chances of triplets, and of their mother, would have been small at this period, so it is possible that the George Pitfield who was at Fulham in 1770 could be the same one who appears in New York in 1780.

Being a parent in 1770 is consistent with a birth date of circa 1749 - the likely year of birth of George Pitfield of New Brunswick.

New York City was the stronghold of the British Forces fighting against the American Colonists in their struggle for independence from the British Crown. A warrant was issued on February 20, 1779, under the authority of the Atholl Grand Lodge of England to form a lodge numbered 210, with no name, According to the American Lodge of Research, this lodge, though mainly composed of civilians, initiated or affiliated a number of men who were under arms on the British side. It seems that George Pitfiel was a civilian and had made his way to New York along with many others who were loyal to the British Crown.

During and at the end of the American War of Independence, 1776-1783, some 40,000 Lovalists moved north into Canada. Of these, 32,000 went to Nova Scotia, most of them in the fleets of ships organized at New York by General Sir Guy Carleton, commander-in-chief of the British forces. New York was the last stronghold of the Loyalists and was evacuated by the British in November 1783, two months after independence had been granted to the thirteen American colonies.

George Pitfield arrived at Saint John, Nova Scotia in May 1783, aboard one of the ships that made up "The Spring Fleet" from New York. The bulk of the Loyalists went to the St. John River valley and the shores of the Bay of Fundy. Aided by government rations, tools and land grants, they carved homes out of the forests and began the long, tough job of pioneer settlement. George is listed as arriving at the Bay of Fundy, along with one servant and received food rations.

This Loyalist influx trebled the existing population of Nova Scotia and thus they heavily outnumbered the 'Neutral Yankees' who had moved north prior to the Revolution. In the Fundy-St. John region the Loyalists at once demanded their own government, complete with elective assembly. The British government fell in quickly with the request and broke up the old province of Nova Scotia in 1784, creating a new Province of New Brunswick which incorporated most of the mainland of the old Nova Scotia and with an elective assembly. Thus New Brunswick became the Loyalist province par excellence.

George settled on land by the St. John's River belonging to Colonel William Spry and in 1786 he was listed as having cleared and improved over ten acres, with 2 dwelling houses, 2 outhouses and owning 2 cattle and a horse. Two others holding land under Colonel Spry had also been members of 210 Lodge in New York.

In 1786, George Pitfield stated in a petition that he had come with The Spring Fleet from New York and had settled on a lot of land belonging to Colonel Spry. This lot was on the Saint John River, below Jemseg Creek, Queens County. In the Petition George asked that he be permitted to hold this lot of land as he had seven or eight acres under improvement.

A new Freemason Lodge - Sion Lodge, No 21, was established at Kingston, New Brunswick, in 1792 and was removed to Sussex Vale, Kings County, New Brunswick in 1799. George Pitfield is listed as one of the founding members of the Lodge in 1792 and became Master in 1802.

It would appear that George did not keep up his original lot of land in Queens County and in 1794 he was living at Sussex Vale. Kings County where he made a petition for 200 acres of land. This petition was made in conjunction with nine others - several of these were members of the New Jersey Volunteer Regiment, giving circumstantial evidence that George could have come from New Jersev.

After settling at Sussex Vale George married Eliza Kenny (1768-1827). Eliza was born at Portsmouth, New Hampshire, the daughter of Samuel Kenny, a loyalist who fought with the British troops. Samuel Kenny died soon after arriving in Canada. George and Eliza had eleven children and the family prospered in Sussex Parish.

In 1796 George was a Warden of Trinity Church, Sussex Vale and later became a Justice of the Peace. In 1809 he stood in the General Election for the House of Assembly, for one of the two seats in Kings County, He was declared elected but the return was declared void and a new election held in 1810, when George was defeated. He stood again in 1819 but was once again defeated.

Eliza Pitfield died in April 1827 aged 59 and George died in June of the same year aged 78 - both were buried at Sussex





The marriage entry at Exeter St. Davids describes John Pitfield as a soldier - this is the only reference I have to this couple and John's origins are unknown.







John Pitfield

The Lancashire Pitfield families

As well as the Pitfields who can be traced back to the county of Dorset I became aware, during my researches, that there were a number of family groups who appear in the UK census returns in 1841, 1851, 1861, 1871, 1881, 1891, 1901 and 1911 who either lived in the County of Lancashire or whose origins were in Lancashire.

I decided to look further into these Lancashire families. I quickly discovered that the names Patfield, Peatfield, Patefield, Paitfield were commonplace throughout the north of England and in particular in the County of Lancashire. References to various spellings of the name appear in the earliest parish records in the mid 16th century. Some of these spellings have survived and the names Patefield, Patfield and Peatfield are in use today.

Within parish and other records in Lancashire the spelling used by some family members changed to Pitfield from around 1760. It is notable that this spelling was only adopted by some family lines and it was commonplace to have Peatfield, Patefield and Pitfield spellings appearing alongside each other in the records, with in some cases different names being used by siblings. By the time of the first census taken in 1841 the Pitfield spelling had become firmly established in several family groups.

The tables that follow show the vast majority of people who appear in the census returns from 1841 and 1911 within the County of Lancashire, or have Lancashire connections, and who used the Pitfield spelling. Some of the lines go back further than 1841 and further forward than 1911 where I have been able to find information. All the Lancashire Pitfields who appear in the eight census returns, can be traced back to one of three family groupings, which I have shown in the charts as Lancashire 1, 2 and 3. Each group is headed by someone who was originally a Peatfield, Patefield or Patfield. I have not undertaken research into all of the many family groups who used these other name variants. Research into the Peatfields, Patfields and Patefields has been done by others.

Some of the Lancashire Pitfield families that are shown within these tables settled in America and Australia, and I have shown their history within these countries where I have the information (some of which has been supplied by Australian and American Pitfield descendants).

James Patefield/Pitfield

Also included in this booklet are tables and notes showing James Patefield from Bradford, Yorkshire whose name changed to Pitfield when he was arrested and subsequently transported to Australia.

The parish register at Tunstall, Lancashire:

Charles Pitfield of this parish Dancing Master and Ann Robinson of this parish were married in this church by Licence with consent of Parents this 26th February 1767 by me John Wilson Curate.

The Allegation and Bond relating to this marriage survives.

The Allegation states that Charles Pitfield was aged 21 years and upward and Ann Robinson was aged 16 years and Elizabeth Robinson her mother gives her consent to the marriage. The Allegation is signed Charles PITFIELD.

The Bond refers to Charles Pitfield and Ann Robinson of Cantsfield within the Parish of Tunstall and Archdeaconry of Richmond spinster. The bond is signed Charles PATFIELD.

Tunstall is in the north of the Count of Lancashire and there are no Paitfield/Patfield/Patfield entries in the parish records before this marriage.

It seems likely that Charles came from the parish of Whalley, in the centre of Lancashire and some way from Tunstall, as he and Ann baptised their first child there:

Baptisms: 18 Feb 1768 St Mary and All Saints, Whalley, Lancashire, England Ritania Peatfield - Daughter of Charles Peatfield of Whalley, Dancing Master

If he was from Whalley then he could have been baptised in 1742:

Baptism: 12 Dec 1742 St Mary and All Saints, Whalley, Lancashire, England Charles Patefield - Son of James Patefield of Whalley, shoemaker.

There are a very large number of Paitfield/Patefield entries in the Whalley registers going back to their start around 1566 and the name appears in the registers through to modern times. There are no PITFIELD entries at Whalley.

Baptism entries for the children of Charles and Ann use the PATEFIELD spelling. However, all of the children who survived to adulthood adopted the spelling PITFIELD in their lifetimes - all the marriages of the children from 1793 through to 1819 use the PITFIELD spelling. The burial entry for Ann (nee Robinson) in 1817 also uses the PITFIELD spelling.



James PATEFIELD and Mary BRINON had at least eight children christened at Whalley and all were named PATEFIELD. Six children survived infancy. The only one of the children to adopt, in part, the PITFIELD was Charles. As can be seen opposite. Charles used the names PATEFIELD. PEATFIELD. PATFIELD and PITFIELD during his lifetime.

In 1786 an Ann PITFIELD married at Whalley to Thomas WILKINSON (not shown on this chart). It is likely this Ann was a daughter of James PATEFIELD and Mary BRINDON, although no christening has been found.

In 1827 Hugh Pitfield and Bryan Pitfield appeared in court charged with larceny - namely stealing horse gear.

Bryan Pitfield was found guilty and sentenced to 7 years transportation. He died 6th June 1827 aboard the Prison Hulk Justitia, moored at Woolwich in Kent, whilst awaiting transportation.

Hugh Pitfield does not appear in the 1841 census. He used the name William in the 1851 census and the name Henry in the 1861 census, but uses his correct name for both of his marriages and the correct name is used to register his death.

A Sarah Lucy Ixer was christened at St. Luke, Berwick Street, Westminster - parents were given as William Ixer, gardener and Mary Ann Ixer. No marriage of a William Ixer to a Mary has been found pre 1858 and no burial of a William Ixer has been found between 1858 and 1869, when Mary Ann Ixer married to Frederick Pitfield. Sarah Ixer, aged 13 and a John Ixer, aged 11 were listed as the step children of Frederick Pitfield in the census of 1871. It seems that Sarah Lucy and John were both illegitimate children of Mary Ann Ixer - although no christening or civil registration of the birth of John Ixer has been found. Mary Ann Ixer and her two children cannot be found in the 1861 census.

In the 1881 census John is listed as the son of Frederick and Mary Ann with the surname Pitfield. By the time John married in 1885 he had adopted the name of lxer Pitfield. Subsequent generations also used the name lxer sometimes it appears as a double-barrelled name - Ixer-Pitfield - whilst at other times it is used as another forename.

Also in the 1881 census a Sarah Pitfield, aged 23, is listed as a lodger in a house close to the home of Frederick and Mary Ann.

At the time of the 1891 census John gives his name as John I Pitfield. At the time of the 1901 census he gives his name as John Pitfield.

- Bryan Robinson Pitfield and Ann Kennyon had a number of children born in England, although no christenings of their offspring have been traced. On the 10th September 1827 the ship "Roman" arrived in New York from Liverpool with Ann Pitfield, aged 46; Ann Pitfield, weaver, aged 25; Richard Pitfield, aged 22; Amelia Pitfield, aged 8; Isabella Pitfield, aged 6; Mary Pitfield, aged 4 and Margaret Pitfield, no age given. I have listed the younger children as daughters of Bryan Robinson Pitfield and Ann Kennyon, although it is possible they were the children of Charles Robinson and Ann Pitfield. They are all listed as coming from Great Britain and intending to live in the United States.
- It seems likely that Bryan Robinson Pitfield and his sons Charles Robinson Pitfield and John Bryan Pitfield had sailed to New York previously probably in 1825 (Charles states he has been in New York for 30 years in the 1855 census), although I have not found them listed on any ship manifest. It seems the family were living together at the time of the 1830 census in New York.

James Pitfield/Patefield/Peatfield/Pitsfield c.1796-1851

James **Pitfield** was born in Bradford, Yorkshire around 1796. (Source Newgate Prison records PCOM 2/191 - see below)

He was originally know as Patefield or Peatfield.

It is possible that he was the James Patefield christened 25th December 1795 at Birstall, Yorkshire, the son of Joseph Patefield of Gomersal (a small village to the south of Bradford).

James **Peatfield/Patefield** is listed in the musters of the 3rd Foot Guards from the end of 1812 and in 1815 James **Peatfield** is listed in a Company commanded by Captain Masters. The company were all listed as being "On Foreign Service" and 5 men were killed on 18 June 1815, indicating they were present at the Battle of Waterloo. (WO 12/1817).

In the musters of the 3rd Foot Guards for 1817 a James **Patefield** was listed in the company commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Aitchison. For the period 25 December 1816-24 June 1817 he was marked "On Duty". For the period 25 June 1817-24 December 1817 James **Patefield** was only listed up to 21st July. No reason for his discharge was given. (WO 12/1819)

The spelling of James' surname changes from PATEFIELD or PEATFIELD to PITFIELD when he comes to the attention of the legal system.

In May 1817 a James Pitfield, was arrested in London for Burglary.

He was detained at Bridewell Prison and transferred to Newgate Prison on 26th June 1817.

Newgate Prison records (PCOM 2/191) state that James Pitsfield was aged 21, born at Bradford, Yorkshire and was a soldier in the 3rd Glos. (The Duke of Gloucester was the Colonel in Chief of the 3rd Foot Guards.)

On 4th July 1817 James Pitfield was tried at the Old Bailey before Mr Justice Parker.

JAMES PITFIELD and CHARLES JACKSON, were indicted for feloniously breaking and entering the dwelling-house of John Keily, about three in the afternoon of the 21st of May (he and others in the said dwelling-house then being). and stealing therein, one watch, value 30s.; one chain, value 6d.; one seal, value 10s., and one watch-key, value 4s., the property of George Doubikin; six tea-spoons, value 30s.; one pair of sugar-tongs, value 10s.; one desert-spoon, value 6s.; one broach, value 6s.; one seal stone, value 5s.; two rings, value. 10s.; one snuff-box, value 3s., and one 10l. bank note, the goods and property of William Mott. (The Proceedings of the Old Bailey)

Jackson was found not-guilty and James Pitfield was found guilty and sentenced to death.

On 22 July 1817 Viscount Sidmouth, who was the head of the Home Office, wrote to the Duke of Gloucester thanking him for a letter he had received from him in which Gloucester had inserted a letter from Lieutenant Colonel Aitchison. Sidmouth assured the Duke of Gloucester that the substance of both letters would be laid before the Prince Regent in Council when the case of James Pitfield was next brought under consideration.

On 13th August 1817 the sentence of James Pitfield was commuted to be transported for life. (PCOM 2/191)

On 8th September 1817 James Pitfield was discharged from Newgate Prison and transferred to the Prison Hulk Retribution at Sheerness. (PCOM 2/191)

On 5th November 1817 James Pitfield was discharged from the Retribution for the Lady Castlereagh. (HO9/7)

James Pitfield was listed aboard the Lady Castlereagh November 1817 for transportation to Australia. (HO 11/2)

James Pitfield is listed in N.S.W. convict indents as arriving in New South Wales aboard the Lady Castlereagh on 1st June 1818. The Lady Castlereagh left after a few days and James Pitfield landed at Hobart, Van Demeins Land, later in June 1818.

James **Pitfield** appears in most of the Convict Musters taken from 1818 until 1836. He was given the Police Number 36. He was employed on "Public Works" and in 1820 he was sentenced to 150 lashes and labour in the Gaol Gang for six months for stealing wheat from a mill.


James Pitfield, convict aged 22 per ship "Lady Castlereagh" married 7th August 1820 at Hobart, Tasmania to Maria Pollard, convict per ship "Janus" aged 19 years.

James and Maria had a son John Pitfield, christened at Hobart, 1820.

Maria died at Hobart 1828

James Pitfield was listed in: Nominal Return of Individuals to whom Free or Conditional Pardons have been issued during the year 1836

James Pitfield died 24th December 1851 at Hobart aged 58 years. Occupation given as stonemason. Cause of death given as asthma.
